





It's a village.






Combined schools' fun-and-colour run

Council drop-in information session

<u>3 December, Michelago Hall</u>. Council staff and elected Councillors Narelle Davis, Tanya Higgins, Craig Mitchell and Luke Williamson displayed the extensive plans for the <u>Snowy Monaro Draft Rural Land</u>

<u>Use Strategy and Draft Local Environment Plan</u>. They discussed them for two



hours with local landholders whose interest ranged from mild to very concerned.

Most concerns focused on changes to rural land zoning. In the Michelago region, the Minimum Lot Size (MLS) for land zoned RU1 is proposed to be increased from 80 to 100 hectares. Some RU1 land is proposed to be rezoned to



Although the event had been well publicised, not many people attended. Council staff ran another information session at Bredbo in the afternoon.

Most of all, I want to thank everyone in the community who has worked with me, shared ideas, concerns and issues and, especially, words of encouragement and support. I cannot tell you how much that has meant.

My priorities for Michelago for 2023 include:

- Pushing UGL and Transport NSW to give final approvals to allow work on the Ryrie St Extension to commence (and then FINISH!)
- Continuing to support residents of Micalago Road with issues associated with the quarry development
- Working with the community and Council to deliver safety issues for Ryrie St, especially in front of the school
- Encouraging the community's input to the draft Rural Land Use Strategy, LEP, Financial Plan and Reconciliation Action Plan
- Monitoring effectiveness of the Waste Management Strategy and the village Bank of Bins
- Ongoing road surface improvements and maintenance
- Opportunities surrounding the Monaro Rail Trail
- And anything else that comes up!

Organic weed-control demonstration

Michelago Landcare recently established a FoamStream demonstration site for weed control, and had a get-together on 19 December at 'Pacawooly' (Gary Morris and Jo Gaha's Clearview Road property) to review the results and show them to a wider audience. Landcare members were advised and invited.




The company rep, Stuart Samson, was onsite to demonstrate the equipment.

The main concept behind FoamStream is that it is totally 'organic' – basically steam and a food-based foam that uses the (captured, enduring) heat to kill weeds. It's broad-based (kills everything) and probably won't reasonably do a broadacre situation until further development, but for breakout patches, paths/roads/sides and some particular weeds, it looks very promising. It has been safely used in fruit orchards in Europe, as there is nothing for the desirable plants to take up.



The site had experimental plots treated to test the effectiveness of the method on several different weed species. Photos at left show a strip 8 weeks after treatment and a new strip being applied.

At the review and further demonstration, Landcare members were joined by SMRC biosecurity folk, who talked about their current priorities and interests and how they can help landholders with education and support to manage both the well-known weeds and the emerging concerns.
