
There is fog on the mountain this morning
A drizzle of rain overnight


There wasn't enough to settle the dust

There is fog on the mountain this morning Like a movie that plays from a reel To watch as the forces of nature compete Such a privilege to witness, I feel.



<u>Sunday 21 May</u>. Twenty cars, lots of people and an amazing range of treasures made this experimental event a success.

The picturesque setting of the lovely old Church of St Patrick, the expansive, treed grounds and the sunny day were an inviting environment.

It was a little windy and cold at times, but that's the risk of late Autumn and people's good cheer made up for it.

The MRCA barbecue (sausages and ready-sliced onions from the Calwell butcher) and the Devonshire Teas coordinated by Janet Kelly, ably assisted by Cath Cotter and Tilly Turnbull and others who donated scones, provided excellent sustenance. A special mention to Susan Ryrie for her very popular shortbread.

The limited facility of only one toilet, the one in the presbytery, was not the problem organisers had feared. This event's successful use of the Church grounds might prompt the parish to see to the repair of the two toilets behind the Church.

The profit of \$642.60 was split 50/50 between the St Pat's restoration fund and the Michelago Railway Station's ongoing maintenance costs.


Feedback from car-boot sale

BCRRF finishes soon



The Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund has been a very generous resource for the Michelago community.

Obtained three years ago with Kerry Rooney's skilled application writing, it has funded the building of the new electric barbecues and the two shelters at the Oval, free food and drink at barbecues, entertainment, the big dinner at the Hall, new tables and chairs, outdoor heaters (see car-boot sale report) and the printing of the *Michelago Magpie* newsletter.

The printed *Magpie*, available at the Michelago Shop, has proven increasingly popular. Some folk prefer the hard copy to the emailed one.

The MRCA thinks the token price of \$2 can continue post-BCRRF with the aid of a friendly local person with a posh printer. The MRCA certainly can't pay the good people at Kwik Kopy to continue printing it, although they've given a discount for including their advertisements.





We have been, and continue to be, grateful for this Federal-State funding. It's enabled the purchase of some substantial community resources that have enhanced opportunities for community interaction.

Community Consultations

Michelago meeting: 10am Saturday 3 June in the Michelago Hall

It has been a busy month for Councillors, as we are out and about at Council-community meetings discussing Council's Operational Plan and Budget for next financial year. We are endeavouring to find the right balance between delivering the services that the community expects and managing our expenditure better.

Rural Land Use Strategy

At the May Council meeting, the draft Settlements Strategy and Rural Land Use Strategy were submitted for adoption, following years of work and community consultation. Following the last round of consultation, a number of changes had been made to accommodate some of the concerns of residents.

However, I felt that the community still needed an opportunity to consider those changes. I moved that the adoption be deferred until further consultation had occurred, and this was passed. Given that Council does not have a budget for further consultation, and at the moment we need to replace both Strategic Planners, this won't happen for a while.

That gives the community plenty of time to discuss their concerns with Councillors, and I will be hosting a couple of local meetings with interested Michelago region people to listen to your views, concerns and ideas. This part of the local government area is unique, with its own set of challenges and opportunities that need to be recognised.

Ryrie St Railway corridor clean-up

A number of residents from Michelago contacted me about the overgrown grass on the eastern side of Ryrie Street at the south of the village.

Since taking responsibility for the rail corridor, UGL had not slashed the grass and the fuel load had built up over a number of years. After I raised it with Council staff, they worked with the RFS and arranged to mow the council-owned verge immediately. Council also negotiated with UGL who followed up with a complete mow/slash of the whole area.


