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NAIDOC Week women's art workshop with Gail Neuss. 7 July, Railway Station



Everybody has stories. Most people don't tell theirs through art or writing. This workshop gave a support structure via First Nation symbols for people to express some of their stories. They used a variety of provided, derivative and invented symbols and symbolic to semirealistic representation. Some stories were too private for publication. Thanks to SMRC for facilitation, NSW Dept of Planning & Environment funding, and Ngarigo woman Gail Neuss, artist.



Some were surprised at the stories they expressed without prior planning. Sometimes you don't know what you want to say until you start saying it.

First Nation artist Gail Neuss provided the symbolic stimuli for attendees to tell their stories.

The Michelago Railway Station was a cosy venue for this intimate gathering.

L: Belinda, a Dharag woman, painted this true story.

It shows the people grouped together beside the river so they could see their children on the other side. Their children had been taken from them.



<u>Tanya Higgins</u> 'The painting represents my family's journey from Kent in the UK, starting with my father's migration to South Australia, raising a family there and then my move from the Murray River to the Snowy Monaro, where I am raising my family.'



<u>Fiona Matthews</u> 'It was interesting what developed. What started as a leaf in earthy colours, surprisingly (or not), turned into a picture depicting fire: the blackened hills at the bottom with ghostly skeletons of trees, black ash falling from the sky and on the right a vortex of smoke and gases above the dry grass in drought. I've been a volunteer with the Burra Rural Fire Brigade for 22 years and I'm currently the Captain. The 2019/2020 fires left an indelible mark on my being and this came out in my painting.'



<u>Jo Biderman</u> 'The painting is full of symbols with the human tracks behind the man and woman leading to the mountain and representing my husband and me on the land where we are building. It's a place of camping (residing) and resting for those who visit, with the sun giving life, as do the rain and the flowing water. It's an image of acknowledgement, respect and gratefulness.'



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MRCA opposes cuts to road funding

The MRCA Committee took issue with a proposal going to council to cut the road budget by \$415,000 to pay for an extra audit.

The emailed letter to Council follows.

Dear Councillors

The Michelago Region Community Association strongly opposes the ridiculous audit recommended in Agenda item 9.3.4 of the business papers for the meeting of 20 July 2023 because it is both unnecessary and wasteful.

It is unnecessary:

 SMRC already has an audit committee comprised of three independent auditors who audit the Council's books every year. That independent audit must be reviewed and approved by the NSW Auditor General every year. That audit is published every year

 If some Councillors or members of the public have evidence of fraud or misappropriation of funds, they should report it to the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption. Where is this evidence? Why haven't they already reported it?

These mechanisms already exist and are used. There is no need to frivolously waste ratepayers' funds duplicating them. You would only do so if you expected to recoup what you're proposing to spend on this audit.

It is wasteful:

The recommendation proposes to cut \$415,000 from the road budget and allocate it to Stage 1 of an unnecessary audit. We would much prefer that money be spent on fixing the unsealed roads in the Michelago region. For example, Micalago and Burra Roads are being allowed to deteriorate into an ever-expanding agglomeration of potholes, leaving bewildered motorists looking for a road to drive upon.

How much money would be spent on Stage 2 of this unnecessary audit? Where would this stop?

Indeed, we understand that the NSW Office of Local Government has advised SMRC that the proposed audit is a poor financial decision.

Road funding is essential. Better roads would improve safety for thousands of residents.

Please vote against this scandalous waste of money.

Rail trail

Michelago residents with land adjacent to the rail track received two lengthy letters from Snowy Monaro Regional Council, dated 11 July, about the proposed Monaro Rail Trail.

The MRCA's previous consultation about the inclusion of the Michelago Railway Station in the rail trail was in March last year (see *Magpie3*, available on <u>www.michelagoregion.org.au</u>), when two consultants, Mike Maher and Mike Halliburton, inspected the site (see photos below).

<u>The first letter</u> concerns the project's Biosecurity Assessment & Risk Management Plan for the sections (1) Tralee to Michelago, (2) Nimmitabel to Old Bombala Road and (3) Bombala to Jincumbilly Station.

<u>The second letter</u> offers individual landholder consultation opportunities, stating that 'the consultants are aware of the submissions made by many people including adjoining landholders when the feasibility study was prepared in 2019.'

<u>Consultation dates</u> for three sections are: (1) 18 August for Queanbeyan to Hume/Tralee, (2) 23 August for Michelago to Bredbo, and (3) 30 August for Bredbo to Cooma.

Further, 'An alternative option is to discuss your issue with the consultants over the phone prior to their corridor inspections.'

An email address was given for a consultant contact but was available only to 28 July, after the publication of this *Magpie*.

Michelago Memorial Hall

There are many excellent improvements happening at the Hall. Some are urgent maintenance and some are innovative.

New Committee member Allan Lehepuu continues to make essential repairs.

- Tennis clubhouse: after adjusting a sticky lock on one of the doors, he checked around and found the pipe from the pump had cracked from frost. The subsequent leak had reduced the tank's water level to eight rings (R). He's replaced the pipe.
- He found another split pipe leaking from the Hall bore and fixed that.
- He's progressing the installation of the sliding doors to the Hall's storage area.

the sound-and-lights system usable. The Committee has to find funds for an electrician to install a switch to obviate the need to climb a tall ladder to switch the system on!

The Better Music man pointed out functioning security cameras and Allan has found a large manual about the system, but needs a video access to see what and for how long they record. Allan has had a couple of offers of old monitors for this. Does anyone know when and by whom the security cameras were installed?

Other Hall happenings

- The solar panels, funded by the previously noted NAB grant, will be installed on Monday
 7 August. The Committee is applying for further funds for battery storage.
- Acoustic curtains: the Committee was awarded the money from the Strengthening Communities fund and is finalising details. Thanks to Kristy McBain's office for alerting the Committee to this opportunity.

- Pre-school Rachel had a tentative return date from Council some time ago, but has had no information since.
- Council money for a dishwasher did not include installation cost (cabinet maker, plumber and electrician). Therefore, the Committee will not buy the machine until there is enough money to complete the project. A Boco Rock fund application for this has been submitted.
- A new sign on the front of the Hall, above the portico, has been quoted at c. \$400, but can't yet be afforded. The present sign is faded and cracked.
- The Hall Committee AGM will be 16 August, 6pm at the Hall. The notice is on the MRCA noticeboard at the shop. It will be an open meeting. All welcome.

Here's a reminder of the revised Hall hiring fees voted on a few months ago by the Committee. These have been recommended to Council.

The Committee wants to make the Hall as community-friendly as possible, so lowered fees last year from the previous fees and is keeping them low while still being responsible about income needed for running the Hall.

A flat fee per hour: \$17.00 Refundable Deposit Bond: \$170.00

Private Evening / Party Function: \$240.00 Refundable Deposit Bond: \$250.00

Requests for hire of Equipment such as tables, chairs, kitchen etc, to be arranged on a case-by-case basis with the Committee.

The Hall is a great place for meetings and functions. The floor is now beautiful, there's plenty of furniture, there's a fridge, microwave, urn, toilets, heaters ... Cooking facilities are there but limited – we're working on that.

The MRCA finished the marathon strongly to get 3rd place. The prize money will be \$2,750 for the Michelago Railway Station. It will take some weeks, if not months, before it's finalised and monies are paid.

Together with the recently announced Council grant of

\$1,500, this will boost the bank account by a total of \$4,250.

The Committee will discuss the best use of this money.

1. We could bank it all and use it to cover the annual operating costs, which are substantial, as they fall due. Truth be told, grants are a bit of a lottery, so we can't assume we'll be so successful in future years.

2. We are involving railway station 'patrons' and receiving feedback on how they think we should spend some of the money. Ideas so far include:

- Upgrading electrical circuitry to allow for heating in addition to the open fire
- Fixing the rocky path to enable wheelchair access to the platform
- External solar lights for evening meetings.



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Creek concerns

After the 29 July Landcare meeting, some members walked along Michelago Creek to inspect the resurgent crack willow menace and the blackberries.

Note: these willows are not the more benign weeping willows. They grow in the creek as well as beside it and will clog it if left to flourish.

They will grow from dropped twigs that then



put down roots and raise shoots. Many eager twigs have come down the creek from land now owned by phone-unresponsive Geocon. *Above: crack willows with Spring shoots in and next to the water.*

In the past, Michelago Landcare has raised funds, as well as using volunteer labour, to control them, but these resources are scarce.

Michelago & Region Landcare meeting

29 July, Michelago Railway Station. Markus Buchhorn, Michelago & Region Landcare President

- Markus reported on the FNPW/GA free tree grant, now finished. Around 50K trees were handed out in the last 18 months to 60+ landholders in our region (Upper Murrumbidgee). Around 11K trees came to the Michelago area.
- Discussion about the quality and features of various tree guards and the steep cost for the best/preferable ones. One landholder noted various grazers were spotting tree guards from a distance and coming to munch, so he stopped using them, and hid new trees amongst older ones, with some success. Great if you can do that. We'll do some analysis on the success rates of both trees and guards across all recipients. Maybe some guards work best in just some contexts.
- Markus reported on the Healthy Rivers grant, which has now largely concluded its work along the Murrumbidgee, and is next going to tackle some work along Michelago Creek [see story 'Creek concerns' above], from the railway bridge to the highway, and maybe further to the junction. Mainly woody-weeds, like willow, box elder, and also some blackberry control. This will work with landholders either side of the creek as appropriate. We'll try to find replacement plants better suited for the creek corridor.
- There's a native fish workshop at the Hall on 5 August (see separate flyer, p14).
- We're looking for some particular project areas for our Landcare group to tackle, with hands-on community participation, and attracting further grants.
- There was discussion of the MRCA interest in village beautification, though that overlaps with Council responsibilities and the Michelago Master Plan and doesn't attract as many Landcare-available grants. Perhaps there's an opportunity to partner, though. Some valuable work could be done on the land adjacent to the Oval down to the Creek, after the weed control. Then perhaps we could build out from there. It's a very visible, accessible and desirable area to connect to the creek. Another option is the railway land beyond the station, alongside Ryrie St towards the bridge and future/returning causeway, though that would involve UGL, and is about 5 acres in size.




