Railway Station Treasure – historic recruitment banner

A recent working bee at the historic Michelago Railway Station unearthed a large red banner, 3 by 1.5 metres, and appliquéd in cloth with a Union Jack, an Australian Ensign and the remaining letters 'THE MEN FR... OW... RIV...'



The original 'The Men From Snowy River' banner is part of the national collection in the Australian War Memorial [Left: Accession Number REL/15959].

It was part of a WW1 'snowball' recruiting march that left Delegate on 6 January 1916, travelled through Bombala, Nimmitabel, Cooma, Bunyan, Bredbo, Michelago, Queanbeyan, Bungendore and Tarago, and arrived in Goulburn on 29 Jan 1916.

The original banner was used again in WW2 for a recruiting drive, this time by car and truck, along much the same route 6–11 July 1940. For Australia's bicentenary, a re-enactment of the first two marches took place on 18-21 April 1988 again using the original banner. In Jan 2006, on the 90th anniversary of the march, a re-enactment and a civic reception at Delegate was held, although the original banner was not carried and a replica was used.

Is the banner at Michelago that replica or one of several created for the event?



The replica, while certainly not as important as the original, still now holds a history of its own and deserves to live somewhere with care. It would be very interesting to hear the story of the 2006 anniversary and find a person willing to restore the replica banner and a home for it. One of the RSLs perhaps? Perhaps on the 110th anniversary just a few years away, it might be used again.

Railway Station promotion

Plans to develop the profile of Michelago's Heritage Railway Station were the focus of a discussion at the station between Belinda Sierzchula of the MRCA's Station subcommittee and Fiona Latham-Cannon of Digital Business Solutions on Monday, 9 May.

The sub-committee sought expert advice about promotion and marketing of the station through social media and businesses.

The promotional possibilities of Instagram were particularly interesting. A large number of Michelago visitors have posted

If realised, the aim to further develop the station as a tourist destination and event venue will help make it financially self-sustaining. At present, the MRCA can pay the expenses only through successful grant applications to government and free services from generous people like Jason Green of Yless4u,





Council Corner – community consultation

Saturday, 28 May, Michelago Hall: the <u>Integrated Planning and Reporting</u> process was the focus of this meeting. SMRC Mayor Narelle Davis was the principal speaker, articulating clearly the options Council is presenting to the Shire. Chief Strategy Officer David Rawlings supplemented Narelle's occasionally interactive talk. Councillors Tanya Higgins (Deputy Mayor) and Tricia Hopkins, and Team Leader Strategic Planning Alex Adkins were also available to discuss issues with people afterwards.

Narelle has provided a summary of the options for the *Magpie*. <u>It's at the end of this issue</u>. It's long, but is an <u>important document</u> for all residents – there are possibly unpalatable choices to be made as this largely new Council faces financial realities, wants to present accurate information transparently, and definitely wants community feedback about which measures the community would prefer.


Mental Health First Aid Courses – Michelago Memorial Hall


Cost: \$20

Integrated Planning and Reporting: summary of discussion with the Michelago Community, Saturday May 28, 2022

To assist the community in understanding the draft Integrated Planning & Reporting documentation, Councillors Davis, Higgins, Hopkins and staff members David Rawlings and Alex Adkins provided information and insights into the <u>key points</u> to encourage your feedback. <u>Rates and a potential rate</u> <u>variation</u> were the key issues discussed, with many questions asked from the community members who attended.

Council provided the following document to the Magpie.

The consultation is open for <u>feedback until Monday 6 June</u> 2022. These plans and financial documents will shape our region and Council's future for years to come, so please have your say today (via the link at the end of this summary).

What is a Special Rate Variation (SRV)?

An SRV allows Councils to increase rates above the rate peg increase determined each year by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART).

Applications for Special Rate Variations (SRV) must be submitted to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for assessment.

Councils can apply for two types of Special Rate Variation

- 1. An increase in general income in a single year (i.e. a 'one-off' variation)
- 2. An increase in general income in more than one year (i.e. between 2 and 7 years).

What is the process?

- 9 May 6 June consultation is undertaken with the community
- 23 June All consultation is considered by Council and a decision is made.

<u>If Council decides not to go ahead with an SRV</u>, the Council will then have to start planning how it will move to a financially sustainable position by continuing to look at service reviews and the level and types of services it can fund. While there is an indication of the impact in the scenarios, the Council will have to work through all of its current services and discuss with the community how they should change into the future.

If Council resolves to apply for an SRV, the following then occurs:

- November 2022 A notice of intention is submitted to IPART
- February 2023 Council applies to IPART for a special variation
- February 2023 Further community consultation is undertaken
- May 2023 A final decision is made by IPART and Council is notified
- June 2023 Council needs to resolve to set the rates at an amount no higher than any approved increase.

What has Council been doing to improve its financial position and reduce the burden on ratepayers? Council has reduced costs by \$5million per annum over the last three years, including by:

- Cutting management costs \$700,000
- Reducing staffing costs \$2million
- Reducing photocopying costs \$200,000
- Increased focus on allocating costs to grant funded programs
- Reduction on building maintenance costs \$700,000.

Who makes the decision about whether a Special Rate Variation is approved?

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) makes the final decision on whether a proposed Special Rate Variation is approved, partially approved or rejected. This decision is final and IPART will not reassess an application after it has made its decision.

What are the rate options being considered?

<u>Rate options: the scenarios below</u> indicate the change in rate levels after ten years and provide an example of the extent of service change that would occur over that timeframe. Next year, rates will increase only by the rate peg in all cases.

Option 1 will see an increase of \$4.20 per week after ten years, following only the state government's yearly rate peg increase and reducing services:

- Increases only the rate peg amounts
- Biosecurity services reduced by 40%
- Building/Development assessments minimum regulatory role only; no assistance
- Rangers doing work week only and responding only to extreme issues on weekends
- Minimal response to illegal dumping
- Close some community facilities
- Reduce library operating days
- Reduce park areas by 30%
- Reduce front-counter services available at Cooma office only
- Cease any economic development or tourism/events activities and support
- Minimal strategic planning to occur Move out of residential aged care services.

<u>Option 2</u> will see an increase of \$16 per week after ten years, inclusive of the state government's yearly rate peg increase, by investing in current services. Increases in rate levels to fully fund the long-term cost of all the current infrastructure building and services:

- Roads: Fund road reseal every 15 years on average
- Fund gravel resheeting every eight years on average
- Gravel maintenance grade every year on average
- Introduce program to renew buildings over time
- Increase maintenance funding to appropriate level
- Move out of residential aged care services.

<u>Option 3</u> will see an increase of \$7.70 per week after ten years, inclusive of the state government's yearly rate peg increase, and reducing services partially:

- A partial increase in rates and service changes to match funding
- Building/Development assessments minimum regulatory role only; no assistance.
- Rangers during work week only and responding to extreme issues only on weekends
- Close some community facilities
- Reduce front counter services available at Cooma office only
- Not undertake any tourism activities
- Move out of residential aged care services.

<u>Option 4</u> will see an increase of \$9.40 per week after ten years, inclusive of the state government's yearly rate peg increase, and a small service reduction:

- A partial increase in rates over a number of years and service change to match funding
- Not undertake any tourism activities Move out of residential aged care services.

The options provide examples of what the Council would need to do at different levels of rates being invested by the community. The final direction may be different to any of the scenarios.
