The much-anticipated barbecue and three shelters at the Michelago oval/sportsground will be ready for community use soon. They are paid for by the Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund, a joint NSW/Federal Government fund.

After the MRCA'S successful application to fund this big project two years ago (thanks entirely to Kerry Rooney), there's been a lot of paperwork, bureaucratic hoop-jumping, organising of quotes and, of course, volunteer time.

All involved in this project are optimistic that this will be a significant facility for the community.

The MRCA hopes to find another friendly government grant program next year that will fund lights in the shelters for evening barbecues.

Local builder Troy Macpherson and Collector electrician Craig Bingley are responsible for the work.

Each year 1 in 5 Australians will experience a mental illness. Many people are not knowledgeable or confident to offer assistance. Physical first aid is accepted and widespread in our community, but most do not cover mental health problems.

Mental Health First Aid® teaches people the skills to help someone they're concerned about. These courses are being offered free with many thanks to funding from the Snowy Monaro Regional Council's Get Ready funding.



Seed Savers Workshop



Arian & Mel from Canberra Seed Savers ran a fun and interesting seed saving workshop at the Hall on Sunday 26 June.

It was fascinating to learn that seeds grown and saved from the best plants in our own climate become more hardy and locally adapted over time. Each little seed comes with all of the genetic information for a new plant – flowers, fruit, seeds and on and on.





We learned how to pick the best plants to save seeds from as well as how long the plants need to mature before the seed is ready to be collected and we had lots of fun practising the skills in processing them.

The golden rule of seed saving is to 'Save seeds from the strongest plants, that produce fruit or edible parts earliest, bolt to seed last, have the tastiest fruit (or best tasting leaves), are most productive, and have the characteristics you want future plants to have.'


We all enjoyed it so much that we have decided to start <u>our own little Seed Savers</u>
& Growers Group and we'd love you to join us!

Our local Michelago & Surrounds Seed Savers & Growers Group will have its first get-together on Sunday 24 July 2—4pm at the Railway Station. Our aim is to save & share seeds, seedlings and excess produce to promote locally grown food and build better resilience in the food supply in our community. We have some very skilled gardeners in our group and so much to share and learn from each other!

Please feel free to come along to check it out even if you have no idea about growing things or saving seeds. Your first meeting is free and then we ask that you join to cover insurance etc. The cost is \$10/year (waged) or \$5/year (unwaged) and you get 3 free packs of seed on joining.

We will also be putting together some locally collected <u>seed packets</u> for sale at the Michelago General Store so that everyone in Michelago can have more success at growing their own food & flowers.


The Committee negotiated with Council to simplify the categories and reduce some charges. These changes will make the Hall more accessible to the community.

In 2018, the MRCA used its funds from Fairs to pay for ceilings under the rafters and closing off the eaves in the kitchen and toilets of the tennis clubhouse.

This solved the bird-poo problem there.

The MRCA couldn't afford to do the same for the central large room, where birds have continued to roost on the rafters and decorate the seats and floor.

This photo was taken July 2021, so Michelago's guano resource is now even richer. Some tennis players have politely notified us that sitting in there to eat lunch

and watch tennis, especially with children, is ⊗!X!%#*?%#@! impossible. Indeed.

The Hall Committee is now trying to fix the problem with, yes, money.

The Memorial Hall Committee has recently applied for a grant in the Council-sponsored Boco Rock annual program to install and paint a ceiling to do the same job as the 2018 one. The application is for

just under \$5K, the total of the two required quotes. The Hall Committee is optimistic.

This shelter and the courts will be more in demand, we anticipate, when the MRCA's nearby bbq project is complete.

Birds will still be able to fly in and out the open windows of this room but shouldn't roost on the seats ... should they? If they do, the Hall Committee will apply for another grant next year to install shutters.

The next Bushfire Course for those wishing to join the RFS will be in September, so July is the time to get the RFS paperwork and mandatory online induction training out of the way.

<u>RFS training</u> is the second Sunday each month 9am- 1pm, and (usually) the last Thursday 6-8pm. Contact details are on the MRCA notice board at the Michelago Store.

Property planning workshop, 7 & 23 April

Di Fett reports: I attended an excellent 2-day workshop on property planning at the Michelago Hall by Ross Kuchel, Senior Agricultural Advisor at Braidwood South East Local Land Service, and Alison Elvin of native vegetation specialists Naturalcapital.

The workshop was held over two Saturdays, 23 April and 7 May, and was attended by about 15 landholders from our region, including Michelago, Colinton, Bredbo, Smith's Road and Burra, and from as far away as Yass.

Attendees were provided with a large laminated map of their properties, and invited to add transparent overlays showing infrastructure, weeds and future plans.

We were also invited to bring along plant specimens for identification and discussion. This provided me with an opportunity to check out an attractive but suspicious tall reed that's doing well in my garden. Regrettably, the verdict is 'don't let it seed'!

Council Corner – Deputy Mayor Tanya Higgins

Community Consultation

I thank everyone in this area who joined in one of Council's recent community engagement meetings. I valued speaking with you all about our Council and your community expectations.

Local Roads

While the sun shines, our road crews can get machinery out on roads. The SMRC has four maintenance teams; you may have seen them working on Smith's, Yellowbox, Applebox, Kelly, Micalago and Karinya Plains Roads and Hugs Lane repairing storm and rain damage. This is despite flu and COVID taking out three teams in late June!

Council has recently engaged external help to assist with asset inspections and road funding claims to ensure we capture and repair all damages from the natural disasters. This will make our road network safe and driveable again. Jerangle, Wild Cattle Flat and Egans roads are being worked on now.

Over \$20 million of capital upgrades of the region are in the pipeline, either being designed or grant funding being applied for, as Councillors have agreed to prioritise getting as many of our roads up to scratch as soon as possible. In the northern part of the region, a number of road upgrades are underway or about to commence, including Tinderry, Numeralla and Countegany Roads.

Smiths Road

You may have heard that due to the rapid increase of costs associated with road building, Tinderry and Smiths Roads were both under-funded by the Fixing Local Roads grant. This has been an issue right around NSW, and Transport for NSW staff have been working with Council staff to find workable solutions. As a result, agreement was reached to use the funds to complete Tinderry Road, and to apply for the fully costed amount for Smiths Road in the next round of the Fixing Local Roads grant.

Michelago Bridge

Council lodged the application to undertake the works in the rail reserve in May. Once approved, tenders will be called for final design and construction. The bridge will be 20 metres, single lane, 68 tonne capacity, with either steel beams with precast concrete decking or similar cast concrete style.

School safety

I raised the issue of speeding traffic along Ryrie St, especially past the school. As a result, the speed monitoring signs have been reinstalled, and I will work with Council's new Road Safety Officer on further measures to improve children's and other pedestrians' safety in the village.

Advocacy

Thursday 13 July: Mayor Narelle Davis and I took Tara Moriarty MLC and Chris Minns, Leader of the NSW Opposition (see right, photo



credit unknown), around some of our poor roads as part of our advocacy work with all politicians to try to secure more funding support for the region. Chris understood Snowy Monaro's unique situation of having the most road kilometres per ratepayer and was also interested in the Monaro Rail Trail.

If you see road crews out and about, give them a friendly wave – they are working hard around a huge network of roads. As always, use the Snap, Send, Resolve app to report any road issues – Council is continuing to make improvements to responses to the app, and we appreciate your patience.
