Welcome to the first MRCA newsletter for 2009.

Firstly I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all those that volunteered their time in 2008 including the MRCA committee.

2008 was a productive year for the MRCA, assisting Martin Hughes with his election to the Cooma Shire Council, the Mayfair, Play by Cooma Little Theatre, and Harvey Norman Bbq's.

The MRCA has also been working with the Cooma Council on upgrades to the oval facilities. We are happy to announce that the Council has allocated \$50,000 to the MRCA proposal for the construction of a path around the oval, as a walking, cycling track. With great thanks to Cr Martin Hughes for his efforts.

The MRCA has also submitted an application to the NSW Dept of Sport and Rec to upgrade one of the tennis courts to a hard surface multipurpose court. We will be advised on that submission in the second quarter of 2009.

Every year the Committee work on a submission to the Council's Management Plan. This assists Council to allocate funding to each locality. Some of the points raised are:

Your Voice on Council

I would like to start by thanking all of you who supported my election campaign. I do believe that we have a well-balanced Council with good representation from most sectors of the community.

The four new councillors have been busy going through the extensive induction process as councillors as well as receiving briefings on the Management Plan, Council policies, strategies and current business matters, including the new Local Environment Plan. The latter is still a work-in-progress. Unfortunately, it will still be some months before it goes on public display for comment as it has yet to pass through the corridors of the NSW State Government.

A draft On-Site Sewage Management Strategy was posted on the Cooma-Monaro Shire Council's website and circulated to all community associations in the shire for public comment. Shannons Flat/Yaouk, Smiths Road, Numeralla and Tinderry Mountains Community Group have submitted individual responses to the proposed strategy and the MRCA (Michelago) has submitted a co-ordinated response from all of these communities, including Nimmitabel. In essence, the NSW Government requires health inspections to be carried out on on-site sewage systems to ensure that they are not creating health hazards to the community nor the environment. Most NSW Councils have on-site sewerage management strategies in place. Council intends to charge fees to carry out these inspections and to re-issue licences to operate.

One of the most effective avenues for bringing local issues to the attention of Council is to have them included in the Management Plan for the coming year. It is not too late to liaise with your community association to raise any issues in its submission to Council for the 2009-2010 Management Plan commencing July 2009. Although the first round for submissions is now closed, you will have the opportunity to present additional considerations on viewing the draft later in the year - do not put it off until next week as next week never comes!

I have been attending local associations' committee meetings (Smiths Road, Numeralla, Michelago, Nimmitabel) to listen to their

issues so that I can make representations to Council on their behalf. This is proving to be an effective strategy in that it is providing a direct link to Council staff as well as a voice on Council in debate. I hope to be able to attend Bredbo and Shannons Flat/Yaouk early on in the New Year.

I have been active in ensuring that the recent Cooma-Monaro allocation (\$410,000) from the Federal Government Infrastructure Fund has been distributed fairly and equitably around the Shire, approximately half going to Cooma township and the other half to the rural communities. These funds cannot be spent on roads or associated infrastructure. Michelago has been allocated \$50,000 to assist with its plan to upgrade the village oval to provide a community venue for residents to participate in a variety of activities. Bredbo, Nimmitabel, Numeralla, Shannons Flat/Yaouk, and Smiths Road were all allocated funds to upgrade/extend their community halls/sheds/facilities and Cooma gets an injection into their funding to upgrade the swimming pool. All in all, an excellent outcome and a good indication that this Council has an inclusive policy for all ratepayers in the shire.

I appreciate that the condition and regular maintenance of our rural roads is of primary concern to most ratepayers. I have put in a personal submission to the Management Plan for 2009-10 for an increased allocation of funds in the budget to address these issues and raise the frequency and levels of maintenance and upgrades for Council roads in the rural areas.

Problems exist in getting information out to rural residents. Mail-outs are costly and can only be used occasionally. If you want to keep informed of current affairs and up-coming events in the Shire and region, I recommend that you buy one of the local Cooma papers or look them up on the web at www.monaropost.com.au or http://cooma.yourguide.com. au (Cooma-Monaro Express). The Council website also provides information and Council's IT experts are currently working on an upgrade to make it more user-friendly. And I will forward selected information to my email contact list as it becomes available. Michelago Pony Club Update

On Sat/Sun 31 Jan/1 Feb 2009 the Michelago Pony Club will be holding its sporting gymkhana at the Bredbo Showground. The gymkhana will be the biggest sporting gymkhana in NSW, other than the NSW State championship, and will involve 2 attempts at each of 17 games. At the end of the 10 games set down for the Saturday the fastest 25 flag race riders from each of the age groupings will compete in heats and a final in the flag spectacular. The final is expected to take place around 3.30pm. In 2007 Katie Slater from the Wamboin club won the spectacular by the narrowest of margins from Catherine Rowley of the Burra club. In 2008, at the club's one-day gymkhana, her younger sister, Penny Slater, won the spectacular.

The club prides itself on its sporting achievements. At the 2008 state sporting championships held at Gundagai five of the club's riders were accepted and acquitted themselves well, namely Heather and Sarah Finch, Aleira Plath, Katelin Blyton and Zac Hope.



The club is hoping that in excess of 100 riders and their families attend the event in 2009. In 2007 attendees came from places such as Cobargo, Yeoval, Molong, Shoalhaven, Dalgety, Snowy River, Cooma and Bega.

Kangaroo Valley?




Soo Bahk WOW!

Constables Column

Now that the warmer months are here I'd like to mention this month a few incidents relating to traffic. There will now be an increase in Random Breath Testing both stationary and mobile on the Highway and also in the village. The main reason for the increase is due to Operation RAID (Remove All Impaired Drivers) which has begun this week and runs nationwide into summer. It is a fact that alcohol and drugs impairment of drivers contribute to a number of collisions. Heavy fines, loss of licence and the possibility of a goal term should be more than enough of a reason to organise alternative transport when consuming alcohol.

When riding push bikes around the village please ensure your children are wearing a bicycle helmet. A number of complaints have been made where children or teenagers are riding around the village without helmets. Apart from been against the law (\$51 fine) it sets a bad example for the younger children.

There have also been complaints about children and teenagers riding motorbikes etc around the roads in the village. Ridding unregistered motor vehicles/ motorcycles is illegal and those persons are not covered for insurance and public liability in the event of an accident. However, if they are ridden through the village to and from a location please ensure that they are ridden at a slow speed to reduce the chance of an incident occurring with other vehicles or a pedestrian.

Remember the contact details for police are emergency 000, non emergency 02 62359131 or to report crime that does not require a police response 131444 (calling from within NSW) or Crime Stoppers to report suspicious activity anonymously on 1800333000. I am happy to speak with anyone about any issues and can be contacted by email on gann1cha@police.nsw.gov. au or request that police at Queanbeyan email me with your contact details and I will attempt to contact you back when next on shift. Please note that when I am off shift police from Cooma/Queanbeyan, Captains Flat and Highway Patrol can attend to incidents in the Michelago area or if urgent I can be recalled to duty by Queanbeyan to attend to them.
