#### **Your Voice on Council**

I continue to disseminate information to my mail-out list in the region. I hope that, for those of you who have registered their email addresses with me, that you are happy with the flow of news, views, calendars of events and other matter that I send out, including the Council Catch-Up page that is published in the Monaro Post each Wednesday. Those of you who would like to be included, please let me know at mshughes@activ8.net.au and I will add you to my address book for future circulars. These include an electronic copy of the newsletter as well as other interesting documents that arrive on my desk.

Some of the issues that I raised in my last column in April have now been resolved. The Cooma-Monaro Management Plan for 2009-2010 was adopted at a Council meeting on 22 June 2009. There were several opportunities for ratepayers to voice their opinions and make submissions over the previous weeks leading up to this decision, culminating, for the Michelago region residents, at a community consultation forum on Thursday 4 June in the Michelago Village Hall. The Michelago Region Community Association (MRCA), on behalf of the community, raised several questions for and at the meeting with Council staff and councillors, which I circulated via email to my mail-out list prior to the meeting. I now provide a resume of these questions and answers as well as for additional questions posed from the floor.

Roads are always of major concern. Cooma-Monaro shire has responsibility for many Council roads but there is only so much money in the bucket (budget). Priorities have to be set for maintenance and re-sheeting. As a result, it is not possible to keep all of the people happy all of the time. Council is aware of the condition of its roads and there is a list of unfunded works that require attention. When additional funds become available, this list is consulted when considering priority for expenditure. I repeat my comment in my last column that ratepayers are encouraged to lodge their concerns with Council as these are recorded, prioritised and added to the list. Council does listen and does respond! Residents of Smiths Road and Tinderry Road have both seen recent improvements to their roads in response to concerns lodged with Council.

For those of you hanging out to see the draft LEP, I regret that I still have no further news. I appreciate your frustration at the delay, but much of the process is out of our hands. We are

aware of the need to publicise the draft as soon as possible and we are working diligently to achieve this end.

And, as for the On-Site Sewage Management Strategy, Council has adopted some modifications to the inspection frequency. After much debate, it was decided that the inspection fee could not be waived as it was necessary to operate on a cost-recovery basis and not place any of this cost on other ratepayers. The renewal 'licence to operate' fee would be included in the rates notice but spread over several years. However, Council did make concessions with the inspection frequency, extending the period for non-aerated systems in the Medium and Low risk areas from 4 and 6-year intervals to 6 and 9 years respectively. And for aerated systems in the High, Medium and Low risk areas to 3, 6 and 9 yrs respectively.

I have continued to attend local associations' committee meetings to listen to their concerns and assist where possible in furthering their interests. I congratulate the MRCA with its success in being awarded a Sport and Recreation grant for \$9,600 to go towards restoring the tennis court area at the oval in constructing a multi-purpose court for local residents to enjoy. This compliments the \$51,500 allocated by Council for the exercise track to be built around the oval, both projects greatly assisting in the realisation of the full oval plan to provide the village and surrounding region with an activity centre providing a variety of recreational facilities.

The June long weekend has signalled the start to the ski season and the increase in Highway traffic. As such the highway patrol have also increased their presence on the highway. So be mindful of your speed both on the highway and around the village. Also don't forget the 40km/h school zone. This warning has come too late for one local resident who issued an infringement notice for speeding through the village last month.

Random breath testing has begun around the village by both highway patrol and myself at all times of the day and night. This will continue in coming months so please don't drink and drive even for a short distance. I would again urge people who witness traffic offences occur to contact me on the below numbers to report the details. You can remain anonymous if you wish. It is your safety these people are placing at risk.

I have also received a number of reports regarding people leaving gates open. If a gate is closed please close it again. There is generally a reason why it is closed. There is an obligation on those that travel through gates to close them again to ensure stock do not stray. I am aware that it is annoying having to open and close them especially when travelling on your own but it is the law and Infringement notices can be issued in some cases to those that leave gates open that were closed.

During June a break and enter occurred on Calabash Road on the Tinderry Mountains where a number of power tools were stolen.

In another instance a number of road signs on the Monaro Highway between Michelago and Royalla have been stolen.

On a positive note during the month of June a teenage female was issued an infringement notice for trespass when caught on the grounds of "The old Inn" just north of Michelago.

I asked my husband if he could see what I was seeing, and the sound of my voice alerted the fighting fox and eagle to our presence and the eagle flew away and the fox started to run off with the chook, but dropped it just a few meters further on and took off at double speed, with me hotly in pursuit. Of course I didn't catch the fox and when I got to the chook, she was dead. Our rooster was in the paddock too – but hiding, and from that day until his death about two weeks later he lost all his cockiness and spent all his time in the chook shed. I think he lost face when he couldn't protect one of his girls.

I've never seen anything quite like this – and it just goes to prove that you really do see some unusual things here in the country!
