My home!







restoration of the tennis courts and the other is the clean up of the railway land at the south end of Ryrie St. The tennis courts have been overgrown for a number of years and the surrounding fencing is dilapidated. We will be restoring the surface of the court and upgrading the fencing so that the court is useable again. Regarding the railway land, we have been in touch with State Rail and they have agreed to the removal of overgrown wild plum trees (a harbour for pest rabbits) and the levelling of the land. They are keen to plant native shrubs and trees in the area but retain many of the productive fruit trees. Keep an eye out for notices of working bees on these projects.

Each year we meet with the Cooma Monaro-Shire Council to discuss their draft Management Plan which spells out how the limited resources at their disposal are to be spent. This year one of the projects in our area to be funded is the upgrading of the junction of Micalago Rd with the Monaro Highway which has been long overdue. There will also be some work done on Tinderry Rd. At our meeting with the Council the Mayor, Councillors and Staff reiterated their willingness to work with the community and encourage anyone to contact them with issues and or suggestions as to how the Council can help improve the services and environment in and around Michelago.

A View from Council

The most recent activity that concerns the majority of ratepayers in the Shire is the Draft Management Plan for the year July 2010 to June 2011. On 15 February, community organisations and individuals from all around the shire presented their submissions to Council. The draft Management Plan was on public exhibition in May and submissions closed on 08 June, community organisations and individuals having been given the opportunity to comment on the Plan. The MRCA organised a community meeting with Council in the Michelago village hall on Wednesday 26 May to discuss the draft Plan and provide any clarification of concerns raised. I also attended meetings convened by Nimmitabel and Bredbo community associations. Communities have submitted 'wish lists' of works and improvements for Council's consideration. Unfortunately, Council does not have the resources to satisfy the majority of requests and many remain unfunded in the Plan. Nonetheless, Council continues to encourage individuals and communities to submit their issues so that, in the event that funds do become available, priorities can be addressed at short notice. The NSW Government has pegged rates increases at 2.6%. This limitation restricts Council's income so that many projects that deserve consideration remain unfunded. Council will adopt the final plan for 2010-11 in June. The Michelago meeting was not well attended even though it was advertised in the last edition of this newsletter, by email (to those who have provided their email addresses) and by notice at the Village Store, Inn and Service Station. I would encourage residents of the region to either join the Michelago Region Community Association (\$5 per annum) or just read the newsletter and keep your eyes open for notices. Ratepayers are encouraged to participate in this process to assist in the future development of facilities, amenities and services to the village and the region.

And (here we go again) for those interested in the progress of the draft LEP, this still has high priority with Council. Your frustration at the delay is shared by Council. Much of the process is out of Council's control but progress is being made, albeit not as rapidly as would be desired.

I live on Lawler Road and enjoy a beautiful block of land that has great views up (south) the Murrumbidgee River valley. One of the features of the river frontage is a remarkable rock cliff around which the river must flow creating a sweeping bend. When the river is in flood (as recently) it breaks through the bend into a backwater before rejoining further downstream. The channel into the backwater catches just about everything and anything that comes down the river. The recent flood has deposited an assortment of riverside paraphernalia some of which I have untangled and retrieved from amongst the flotsam that was carried downstream. If anyone is missing any such items, please contact me (see below) and we can determine if I have recovered any of your losses.

I have continued to attend local associations' committee meetings and events to listen to their concerns and assist where possible in furthering their interests. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate the MRCA for organising and running a very successful Mayfair on Sunday 2 May and for providing the community and visitors a great day of entertainment and

activities along with such an interesting and vibrant selection of stalls and food outlets. The success was due to great community spirit with many local groups and individuals participating in providing services, activities, entertainment and merchandise. The new oval exercise track proved to be a great asset in the layout of the fair. There is also a plan to resurrect the tennis courts down at the oval and put up a basketball hoop.

While the weather may have cooled since the last report a number of activities have occurred and are occurring for police in our local area. The main issue now is that of the increase of traffic on the Highway now that the snow season has commenced. Queanbeyan Highway Patrol has begun conducting an increased presence in the local area and has achieved good results so far. An example was a few weeks ago when a teenager was detected travelling at 151 km/h at Michelago on the Monaro Highway and subsequently stopped. The driver had his licence suspended on the spot and issued a fine in excess of \$1500. If the excessive speeding was not bad enough the vehicle had bald tyres and was deemed unroadworthy. I have requested Highway Patrol conduct speed

enforcement duties and mobile breath testing in and around the village while they are working the highway.

I again remind people not to become complacent with home security especially on rural properties. The reminder comes after a rural property in Michelago was broken into last week with two laptops stolen. Please keep an eye out for your neighbours and report any suspicious persons or vehicles to police. While this break and enter appears to be an isolated incident there are those out there that will take advantage of our complacency.

I have recently received information regarding drug use and supply in our local area by an isolated minority. As a result I am currently following up on a number of good leads from the information already obtained however if anyone has any further information which could assist me please contact me by email or contact the numbers below. I can assure that the information will be held in the strictest confidence and can be supplied anonymously through crime stoppers.

There have been a number of reports made to me of illegal dumping of rubbish, green waste, abandoned cars on a number of roads around the local area. All matters of illegal dumping are investigated by Cooma-Monaro Council rangers and if offenders can be identified large fines can be issued by rangers. Please assist all in the community by reporting illegal dumping to Cooma-Monaro Council Rangers or myself.

As mentioned in my last report a state-wide audit of firearms and firearm storage safes is well underway. It will be conducted over the next couple of years. I am continuing with the conducting of a number of local audits. As the last audit was conducted in 2003 now is the time to check with the firearms registry to ensure up to date including contact details. The firearms registry can be contacted on 1300 362 562.

Finally if anyone has any questions, comments or feedback please send me an email. Community information assists me greatly in performing my duties.

Remember the contact details for police are emergency 000, non emergency 02 62359131 or to report crime that does not require a police response 131444 (calling from within NSW) or Crime Stoppers to report suspicious activity anonymously on 1800333000. I am happy to speak with anyone about any issues, comments and feedback. African Lovegrass

"Living with Lovegrass" was the title of a recent workshop run by the Southern ACT Catchment Group (SACTCG). African Lovegrass is now a big problem in the ACT as it is in many areas of the Monaro. The basic message that came out of the workshop is that once you have 80% of your grassland occupied by African Lovegrass it is virtually out of control and you have to learn to live with it and manage it. If parts of the property are heavily infested and others not, then fencing off the worst areas and controlling it mechanically or chemically in the other areas is recommended. The seed does not spread by wind so, unlike serrated tussock, it is potentially easier to control. A proceedings of the workshop will be available soon on the SACTCG website http://www.sactcg.org.au . For expert advice on African Lovegrass, contact the Shire Council Weed inspectors.
