President's Report

The Cooma-Monaro Shire Council, as part of the Local Environment Plan (LEP) process, is considering how Michelago and the surrounding region might develop over the next ten to twenty years and it is seeking input from the community. It is likely that in this time the village's population will double to about 200. A smaller but significant increase is also likely in the surrounding region.

We have formed a sub-committee of Wayne Landford, Fiona Maguire, Cate Spencer and Julie Giucci to prepare a MRCA response. Over the next month or so they will be seeking views from residents in the village and surrounds. This of course does not preclude other groups or individuals in the community providing a view directly to Council. The Council has indicated that they encourage and welcome all community input.

We are pleased to see that the Council has been upgrading the Micalago Road and Pony Club Road junctions with the Monaro Highway. These upgrades were requested in our submission to the Council's Management Plan, and provide a good example of Council responding to community concerns.

I would like to welcome the new MRCA committee (see this page) and give my sincere thanks to those Committee members standing down this year. Your input last year was much appreciated.

Local History

Gay Lawler is researching the history of our village and the surrounding district. Here is a taste of what she has discovered.

THE HIBERNIAN HOTEL

This two-storey stone building is on the right-hand side of the highway going north from the village turn-off. It dates from 1872, and replaces the earlier hotel of the same name established in 1856 by Thomas Kennedy and his wife Mary (nee Maher). Both buildings also served as Coach Offices, offering accommodation and stabling for travellers to and from the Monaro. After the death of 55-year old Mr. Kennedy in March 1875, Mary retained ownership until her death June 1894, aged 82.

In June 1866 the notorious bushrangers, the Clarke brothers, and some others of the 'Jingera Mob', made a second assault on the village in only a matter of months. Instead of the Post-Office Store, their attention this visit was focused on the old Hibernian, where they held captive many of the locals, while they ransacked Abraham Levy's store across the road. The day was rounded off by 'drinking the hotel dry' (or almost) and forcing their captives to do the same, before staggering off to their hideouts in the Jingera range east of the town. Those left at the Inn were in no fit state to give chase. The family of the local police officer, Constable Moran, were amongst those detained, 'the law himself' riding escort with the gold-carrying coach, en route from the Kiandra diggings to Queanbeyan.

The absence of a School of Arts or Hall in the village meant the Hibernian served as the local hub, hosting concerts, balls, fundraising activities for the church, sports days, auction sales and the best place to celebrate winnings (or drowning sorrows) after the local horse races.

After the death of Thomas & Mary there were different licensees until the sale to local property owner, Mr. W. Lenane in March 1895, and another change of ownership in 1900, to George Fane De Salis (late of 'Cuppacumbalong') .The name of the property changed to 'Soglio' and the old inn became the family home, occupied in the latter years by the four Misses De Salis, until 1962. 'Soglio' continues in family ownership and a working property.

Michelago Cricket Club



Pam Houssenloge has just released a book about food intolerances called *Oscar's Lunchbox*. I talked to Pam about the book and discovered that we have yet another creative person amongst us. Pam lives on Baroona Road with her husband Craig and their children.

I asked Pam "Why Michelago?"

Pam: "We have lived here for 10 years and discovered the place after travelling around

Australia for a year. It was a spontaneous decision which we've never regretted. We love the bush, the village, the school and the community"

Pam: "It was 4 years in the making and came from the personal experience of raising a child with food intolerances and has developed into a passion to teach children how important it is to listen to their bodies when they make choices about the food they eat. A subcommittee of the MRCA is busy campaigning for the repair and re-opening of the train line from Canberra to Michelago, as the first stage of a proposal to rebuild the line all the way to Cooma.

The first objective is to get the NSW Government to agree to fund a feasibility study on the reopening of the whole line, connecting it with the Queanbeyan and Sydney lines, with Canberra-Michelago as the first stage. This would take into account likely freight, commuter, snow and tourist use of the line in the new carbon-taxed environment.

A View from Council

We have a new State Government, and NSW Councils are waiting to see what changes this might bring to Local Government. During the campaign, several pertinent issues were discussed and policies promoted, and Councils now wait for announcements to support those platforms. Congratulations to John Barilaro for winning the seat of Monaro. The community looks forward to working with him and his government to seek further improvements to communications, roads and other services for the region.

The new Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework, which

includes the Community Strategic Plan, is developing to the point where communities will soon be consulted on their vision for the future of their communities. This replaces the current Management Plan and Social Plan (by June 2012).

Summer is over and autumn is well on its way. After the heavy rains, bridges and roads damaged by flooding have been repaired/restored/re-gravelled as necessary, although there is still work to be done. According to the long-range forecasts, our winters are going to be drier and our summers wetter. If so, hopefully our roads will have a respite from the flash-flooding that has occurred over the summer. Council appreciates residents' patience and understanding through this difficult period.

Celebrations for Australia Day were held throughout the shire. Australia Day Ambassador Dr Cindy Pan, accompanied by her two children, attended the Michelago celebrations before going to Bredbo for morning tea. She also dropped in on the Driver Reviver being run by the MRCA and local RFS fire brigades at Ingelara Rest Area. She then went onto the celebrations in Centennial Park Cooma. Congratulations to our Local Citizen of the Year, Mr Brian Coyte and the other award winners - and also to nominee and local resident, Tony Robinson, a worthy contender for the honour.

Cooma celebrated Harmony Day on 20 March 2011 with a Multicultural Festival in Centennial Park. This was a remarkable display of Australia's diverse and colourful cultures and costumes with 14 different nationalities demonstrating their traditions of song, dance and music. It is very family-orientated, and I recommend attendance next year if you could not make it this year.

And, on events, don't forget that this is a two-way street — Cooma would like to see you attend their events and Michelago would like those from other parts of the shire to come along to their Mayfair on Sunday 1st May for another great family day. Constables Column

As always I will start with the traffic report. Topping the list is a 44 year old male who was stopped by police on the 3rd March, 2011 after being detected travelling at 145 km/h south on the Monaro Highway at Michelago. A breath test was conducted with a reading of 0.145

returned. The driver was charged with the speeding offence and Mid Range PCA (Prescribed Concentration of Alcohol). He will face Queanbeyan Local Court in April.

In similar circumstances a 41 year old male was stopped on the Monaro highway south of Michelago after detected travelling at 120km/h. He was also subjected to a roadside breath test which returned a reading of 0.065. As was the case above this driver was charged with the speeding offence and Mid Range PCA.

A 46 year old male was stopped on the Monaro Highway south of Michelago for a breath test. A check of his licence revealed he is currently disqualified until 2014. Further checks revealed he had 3 outstanding warrants. As a result he was arrested and charged with disqualified driving and the outstanding warrants.

A 48 year old female was stopped on the Monaro Highway south of Michelago by police for a breath test. When her licence was requested she provided false details. Subsequent checks revealed the female was unlicensed. She was charged with providing false particulars and driving without a licence.

During the previous month there have been two collisions one each on Micalago Road and Tinderry Road, Michelago. Both were on dirt roads at night and both were a single vehicle collision. At this stage both collisions are still being investigated. These collisions are a timely reminder to drive to the conditions especially on dirt roads no matter how well or how often you travel along the road.

In previous columns I have mentioned instances of domestic dogs attacking sheep and causing motor vehicle collisions. It appears that dogs are still causing problems both in the village and the surrounding area. It is the law that all dogs are placed on a lead while in a public area. It does not matter whether they are the gentlest dog to the most vicious. The law also applies to cats and other livestock. ALL breaches of this law will be referred to the Cooma-Monaro Council Ranger to take action. The fines are hefty, as two residents found out last month.

As I have mentioned in previous reports a state-wide audit of firearms and firearm storage safes continue and will do so until every firearm licence holder has had their firearms inspected. Please ensure all details are correct and if changes need to be made or for general firearms enquiries please contact the Firearms Registry on 1300 362 562.

Remember the contact details for police are emergency 000, non emergency 02 62359131 or to report crime that does not require a police response 131444 (calling from within NSW) or Crime Stoppers to report suspicious activity anonymously on 1800333000. regular basis even when on leave and will call you back promptly.

Food for thought

Learning to grow, gather and use plants is very rewarding and our very survival may depend on it if something were to happen to our major food source (the supermarkets). This is the first of a regular piece that explores the uses of a particular wild or cultivated plant that grows in our area.

Pumpkins:

If there is enough water pumpkins grow quite well.

The fruit of the pumpkin is very useful. You can make soups, muffins, roasts etc. They store well and can even be dehydrated. However did you know that you can also eat the seeds- raw, roasted or boiled? A bit fiddley but nutritious and tasty. The flowers and young shoots are also edible. At this time of the year you can use all the flowers as there is not enough time to set and grow fruit before the frost. Otherwise just harvest the male ones (they are the ones with the longer stalk). The flowers can be battered and fried like tempura or they can be added to pasta or risotto. The stalks are tasty too- just peel off the tough outer layer and either eat raw, steam or add to stir-fries. (Ref: Isabell Shipard)
