Scoop! UGL signs for the bridge land! You saw it here first!

This might not sound as exciting as the roar of bridge-building at the creek, but no signing = no bridge. *Magpie22* detailed the final block, now gone. It's no longer just 'priority' pushing; now the bridge *will* happen. Councillor John Rooney started the serious campaign back in 2018, when he was Mayor. The MRCA has continued lobbying, Councillor Tanya Higgins has relentlessly pursued many influencers, and Council staff have given maximum support. Thanks to MLA Steve Whan for helping turn the final wheels in the bureaucratic machinery.

So, after all, there's no need for the semi-planned busload of pickets and pitchforks heading to UGL's Sydney office and the NSW Parliament. Might have been fun ...

Final bureaucratic block removed!

Snowy Monaro Regional Council and the Michelago community have crossed the final hurdle to the construction of a bridge over the Michelago Creek, finally receiving a licence from UGL/TfNSW this week.

Council now only needs to align Telstra with delivery of the pre-constructed bridge components and the works teams (who are working on another bridge at the moment) and a start date will be included in the Operational Plan.

The construction of a safe crossing of Ryrie St over Michelago Creek is long overdue. Over time, the number of families living along Micalago Road has grown significantly, as has the traffic using the Monaro Highway. Residents of Micalago Road should not have to use the Monaro Highway to access the village.

Engineering advice to Council was that a ford-style crossing would no longer be appropriate and that construction of a bridge would be required.

From 2018 onwards, former Councillor John Rooney worked hard to get the bridge onto the Council's agenda and into the Michelago Masterplan. At that time, the other councillors were primarily focused on addressing the infrastructure needs of Bombala and Delegate. It was not easy to win support around the table for any expenditure on Michelago. Finally, in 2020, Council agreed to build the Michelago bridge with funding coming from the Commonwealth Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

In 2021, once funds had been received, the bridge was designed and costed, and it was recommended that the crossing be realigned to avoid a deep part of the creek, protecting construction from future flooding events and making it cheaper to build.

This alignment would need part of the bridge to be situated on part of the disused railway corridor. Council commenced getting all of the approvals needed to construct the bridge, including Department of Fisheries, to approve additional culverts, and Telstra, who had to move their assets.

<u>The complicating factor</u> was the use of the railway land, managed by UGL on behalf of Transport for NSW. There is a great deal of legislation that governs the use of railway corridors, and it is not a simple procedure to apply to use it.

Council agreed to pursue two simultaneous processes to lease the land and ultimately purchase it. UGL and TfNSW not only had to approve the land transfer, but also the bridge construction itself. This process was started in March of 2022.

No one would have ever imagined that it would take just about two years for Council to receive the approvals required to construct the Ryrie Street bridge.

The Michelago community was very concerned that inflation would ultimately mean that the grant money would not be enough to build the bridge or that the money would have to be returned to the Commonwealth Government as unspent funds. Council tendered for the bridge to be constructed in a style that meant that most of it could be pre-formed, and then put into place by Council construction crews.

Councillor Tanya Higgins worked with the community, Council staff, Member for Monaro Steve Whan and Transport for NSW to expedite the approval process through layers of bureaucracy.

<u>'I must commend Council staff for their persistence in applying pressure to UGL'</u> said Councillor Higgins. 'It was like navigating in the dark, never seeming to get to the end of the tunnel. As one approval was finalised, we would then have to start another.

<u>The Michelago community has been amazing</u>, with so many people rallying themselves to advocate to their NSW representatives, and raising awareness using social media and the local press. They have had to wait a ridiculous amount of time to get a critical piece of infrastructure.'

<u>The lack of crossing has impacted on the village in many ways</u>. Families living on or off Micalago Road have been limited to car travel and had to use the Monaro Highway to enter the village. This has limited school children's ability to ride their bikes to school, and some people have made the decision not to enrol their children in the village school due to this.

RFS volunteers living on Micalago Road have also had to drive the long way round to get to the Michelago Fire Shed for callouts, and all of this traffic has to go past the school, impacting on road safety for students.



Michelago villagers can now look forward to being joined up, with improved access to the general store, sporting and community facilities, and the school. It is hoped that this news will encourage new families in the rural residential zone of Micalago Road to enrol their children in the local school, which may encourage further investment by the NSW Department of Education. A bridge to the past

Michelago is always waiting for a bridge. Here's some history from 1875. This would have referred to the creek crossing on the Monaro Highway. The railway line and station were not built until 1887 so the village of Micilago, as it was then spelt, was still on the highway. The village was comprised of the Hibernian Inn, the Michelago Police Station and Gaol, Abraham Levy's general store and the small stone church of St Patrick's.

Shortly after the original newspaper article below, in 1875 the spelling had changed from Micilago to Micalago.

Monaro Mercury, and Cooma and Bombala Advertiser (NSW: 1862 - 1931), Saturday 3 July 1875, page 2

'MICALAGO.

June 29 – The weather during the past week has been very cold. On Saturday night we had heavy rain. Sunday was the coldest day we had this winter. The Tindery mountains are covered with snow, and the great coat is in requisition.

Tenders are called for the erection of a bridge over the Micalago Creek at last. Every flood that comes down this creek leaves a quantity of sand in the roadway, which makes it difficult for heavy laden drays to pass over.

Mining matters are at a standstill just now, as Mr. Maguire has not got the race finished, but he expects to have it completed this week, when he will commence crushing. Correspondent to the Queanbeyan Age.'

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
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Michelago Magpies have wings on their feet


New fence at the Oval – not happening ... yet

Alerted to an imminent sports grant by Cr Tanya Higgins, MRCA Treasurer Kerry contacted Council to investigate the requirements, as the Michelago Oval is Crown Reserve land managed by Council.

The Oval was originally *donated* to the then Council as a cricket ground by Andy and Jim Kelly in the early 1900s. During WWII it was gazetted as a Crown Reserve (15/5/1942).

The current fence is a dilapidated eyesore, but the Michelago Cricket Club is less focused on aesthetics than the wish for a high fence (like that at the tennis courts) to restrict the range of cricket balls. As the club is not incorporated, it can't apply for grants, but the MRCA is and wanted to help the MCC with this.

However, as it turns out, the land's status means that State government regulations and Council requirements would make the lengthy grant application process overwhelmingly daunting. The MRCA does not have the personnel resources to undertake this.





Linked story: John Kelly (Michelago Elder and once a firstgrade cricketer) said a new fence would just provide an





incentive to batters to hit sixes over the top.

He reminisced about a match between Jerangle and Michelago at Michelago. Jerangle opened the bowling with one of its best.

Clive, John's dad, opened the batting and hit into the creek off the first ball of the match. There was plenty of water in the creek and the fielders had to wade in and find the ball. This took quite a while. Many runs ensued.

Care and use of tennis courts, clubhouse and barbecues

While the <u>tennis courts</u> are free for individuals to use, the professional coach paid a daily hire fee to the Memorial Hall Committee, which is responsible to Council for their upkeep.



Volunteers do the work of weed spraying, clubhouse cleaning and minor repairs when they can. They ask that people treat the facilities with respect, close the court gates when they leave and take their rubbish with them. There is a Council bin next to the public drop-dunnies near the road, but not at the courts.

<u>Toilets</u>: These are kept locked by the Memorial Hall Committee. They will be opened on request for events. Otherwise, please use the drop-dunnies next to the road. These are serviced by the mowing contractors, John and Ivan Colaric.

Kitchen: This can also be used by people organising events.

<u>The electric barbecues</u> were bought and installed for the community in 2022, thanks to a grant obtained by the MRCA from the Bushfire Community Relief and Resilience Fund. The MRCA oversees them.

<u>Please clean them after use</u> – turn on the heat (the button press works for 10 minutes), tip a little water on the plate and wipe with paper towel. Be careful of burns! It would be appreciated if users could also wipe the area surrounding the hotplate.

It recently took an MRCA Committee member half an hour to clean up after recent users (*see R*). Let's leave them nice for the next person.





Memorial Hall Committee

The <u>tennis clubhouse's tank</u> wasn't filling. Allan found the down pipe was blocked with what he called 'brown high-value mulch'. He added 'Fortunately, the person who put it together used screws rather than glue so I could pull it apart.'

Allan has put new two-way latches on the <u>tennis court gates</u>. The old bolts didn't line up with the fence. If court users close the gates, there'll be no more kangaroo poo in there.

Michelago Fire Brigade – joining the team

The Michelago Rural Fire Brigade has been part of the community for three decades.

The brigade is run by volunteers for everybody's benefit. We attend fires, motor vehicle accidents and other emergencies. We also offer advice on fire safety.

And while the Fire Brigade operates all year round, it's understandable that people often think about joining over Summer. So what's involved?

The level of commitment varies, but usually involves training about once a month.

This summary below (p15) from the Rural Fire Service sets out the steps involved.

It's worth noting that the Michelago Brigade does conduct interviews (step 4 below) as it is important that prospective members find out about the responsibilities – and benefits – of joining.

Membership of the brigade is a practical way of contributing to community. You can also develop useful skills, and enjoy being part of a team.

If you are interested in finding out more, a good place to start is to speak to a member you know, or drop into the shed if it's open, or contact the captain, Keith Howker (🕻 0406 887 435) or President Brent Wallis (**\$** 0435 794 432).

10 STEPS TO BECOMING A VOLUNTEER

JOINING A RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

STEP 1

GET STARTED

Becoming a volunteer with the NSW Rural Fire Service is easy, and there are a surprising number of roles available. First, consider the kind of volunteer work you would like to do, and the time you can spare. It's also a good idea to discuss your intention to volunteer with your family, friends or employer – their support can be crucial.

STEP 2

CONTACT YOUR LOCAL VOLUNTEER RURAL FIRE BRIGADE

The next step is to contact your local rural fire brigade. The members of the brigade are all volunteers and can help you decide whether volunteering is right for you. If you're not sure where the brigade is located, ask your nearest Fire Control Centre or email volunteer@rfs.nsw.gov.au.

STEP 3

THE APPLICATION

Complete the Volunteer Membership Application Form and return it to the brigade. If you are over 16 you will also be asked to complete a National Police Checking Service Consent Form and provide identification.

STEP 4

THE INTERVIEW

You may be invited to attend an interview with the brigade you are seeking to join. The interview will cover the types of things you can expect as a volunteer, what your role in the brigade will involve and what the NSW RFS expects from its members.

STEP 5

PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP

If both you and the brigade wish to proceed, your application will be sent to the District Manager for endorsement. At that point you become a "probationary member pending clearance".

STEP 6

CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECK

It is important for the NSW RFS to make an assessment about each applicant's suitability for membership because our volunteers hold a position of trust within the community, so a criminal history check will be conducted after your application form is endorsed. Your privacy will be protected in this process.

STEP 7

COMMENCE INDUCTION

While you wait for clearance, you can commence some activities with the brigade under supervision. During this time there are some restrictions on the types of activities you can participate in.

STEP 8

OUTCOME OF APPLICATION

If your application for membership is successful, you will receive a letter containing your membership number. You can now participate fully as a volunteer member of your brigade.

STEP 9

TRAINING FOR YOUR ROLE

The NSW RFS provides training opportunities to all members free of charge, giving you the knowledge and skills to work safely in your chosen role. Once trained, you will be provided with the appropriate clothing and equipment for your role.

STEP 10

ORDINARY MEMBERSHIP

You will remain a probationary member for a minimum of six months, and at the end of the probationary period your brigade will vote on whether to accept you as an ordinary member.

Soil workshop at the Memorial Hall 16.12.23

This most informative session was a followup to the Living with Lovegrass field day of 7 October (see *Magpie 21*).

This one focused on the many aspects of soil, including geology, physical and chemical characteristics, how to identify different soils and their effect on vegetation and livestock.

Participants had submitted soil samples from their properties for analysis and the results were graphed for various important plant growth nutrients such as sulphur, potassium and phosphorus.

NSW Local Land Services agronomist Jo Powells* presented and explained the results.

The scope of the whole workshop is normally run over three days, so Jo managed to provide a lot of information in four hours. This workshop was free, supported by Local Land Services and run in partnership with Upper Murrumbidgee Landcare and Michelago Landcare.

Thanks to Georgianna Storey, coordinator of Upper Murrumbidgee Landcare, for organising this intensive session of information and the very welcome lunch.




