

Afterwards, there was food at the MRCA barbecues and some lively soccer on the sportsground.





































Everyone is welcome. You don't have to be a 'senior'.




ANZAC Day, 25 April 2024

Michelago Memorial Community Hall Horror

The Hall Committee was horrified and distressed recently to discover these and a few other scratches on the hall floor. →

They appear to have been made by a chair being dragged – possibly with a load on it, as some scratches are deeper than others. They have been made sometime in the last few weeks.

Recently purchased chairs have rubber tips on their feet and are at the front of the storage area for easily available use.

Older chairs with no protective tips are reserved outside, in the back yard, for event hiring, eg barbecues, outdoor parties.



<u>Users of the hall are requested to use the chairs and tables in the storage area and to lift all furniture</u>. That is, please *do not drag it*.

In other words, the Hall Committee asks that users look after the floor as if it were their own – which, in a sense, it is, this being their community hall.



This floor, costing around \$12.5K last year, was properly and professionally polished and sealed, but all polished wood floors will scratch if treated carelessly.

The money was raised by the Hall Committee through grant applications and fund-raising events.

Michelago and District Landcare - 2024 AGM and project plans

We've had a very busy 12 months, with a number of workshops, stalls, and information sessions attracting well over 100 people from our area everything from weeds, to weeds and more weeds were very popular topics, as were tree planting, erosion control, feral animal management, and hollow/nest development, amongst others.



There were also some valuable training events run, funded through grants shared across our Upper Murrumbidgee Landcare community that gave member landholders the opportunity to be certified for e.g. chemical transport, use and storage (ChemCert). All this for a tiny annual membership fee!

The 12 months ahead provide some new opportunities, especially the generous offer of a donation to support community Landcare activities.

In particular, we're exploring rehabilitating the Michelago Creek side below the Michelago Oval.

This would include some work to slash some of the taller and less-desirable grasses, and building off the recent woody-weed control done there.

This would be followed by planting out an area of new trees and shrubs — and maybe some seeding – to help stabilise the soil, and reconnect the village to the creek at one of its most beautiful locations.

We'll aim to have a number of working bees (and social barbecues) throughout the coming year, and then build on the project in future years with other grants and community inputs.

<u>Other projects</u> may also emerge over the next year as grants are announced, including further plantings, seed collection and propagation and, as always, any other topics our members are interested in.

Local History: the walking track at the Michelago Oval

This excellent, much-used piece of Michelago infrastructure needs the history recorded, as there's been a bit of misinformation around, or maybe just vagueness. *Magpie* thinks credit needs to be given where due.

The following research is from Kerry Rooney.

On a cold August day in 2010 the concrete path and the steel rail fence at Michelago oval were officially opened by Steve Whan then (and now again) Member for Monaro. The Cooma-Monaro Council applied for a grant from the Federal Government's Infrastructure Fund and received \$410,000 for various community projects. Of that, \$51,500 was allocated to the path at Michelago.

The MRCA President at that time, Tony Robinson, thanked then Councillor Martin Hughes for his efforts in helping Michelago receive funding for its nominated project.

From the archives ...

January 2009 MRCA President's Report

'The MRCA has also been working with the Cooma Council on upgrades to the oval facilities.

We are happy to announce that the Council has allocated \$50,000 to the MRCA proposal for the construction of a path around the oval, as a walking and cycling track.

With great thanks to Cr Martin Hughes for his efforts.'

April 2009 MRCA President's Report

'Michelago residents may be interested to know that the MRCA was successful in its bid through the Council to the Federal Infrastructure Fund for the construction of an exercise track around the oval. This was one of the improvements requested on our wish list.

The Federal Government's Infrastructure Fund, grants to communities (\$410,000 for Cooma-



Monaro), announced before Christmas, has brought significant benefits to most communities in the Shire, all submitted projects having been approved by the Government.

Michelago will be receiving \$51,500 to upgrade facilities at the oval, primarily an exercise track for cyclists, skate boarders and runners.

In the meantime, the MRCA (Michelago Region Community Association) is waiting on the



outcome of a Sport and Recreational grant application to upgrade the tennis courts for multipurpose use.

Once these works have been completed, the Michelago oval will be well on its way to providing a range of facilities for all ages.'

Winter 2009 MRCA President's Report

'As mentioned in the last newsletter, we have been successful in raising money for a multipurpose sports court and exercise track around the oval. Planning for these facilities is proceeding with Council.

<u>Cr Hughes reported</u>: "I congratulate the MRCA with its success in being awarded a Sport and Recreation grant for \$9,600 to go towards restoring the tennis court area at the oval in constructing a multi-purpose court for local residents to enjoy."

This complements the \$51,500 allocated by Council for the exercise track to be built around the oval, both projects greatly assisting in the realisation of the full oval plan to provide the village and surrounding region with an activity centre providing a variety of recreational facilities.'

Spring 2010 MRCA President's Report

'The new exercise track and the rail fence on the oval were officially opened by our NSW Government member Steve Whan at 1.00 pm, 26 August.'

The Rural Fires Act, 1997 provides for a statutory Bush Fire Danger Period (BFDP) commencing 01 October and ending 31 March in the following year. During the BFDP, landowners and managers are required to obtain permits before lighting fires for land clearance or fire breaks.

The NSW RFS Commissioner may declare a variation based on the recommendation of a local Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC). This declaration can be varied on either a temporary (seasonal) or permanent (reoccurring) basis and remains in force for the period specified unless it is revoked.

Due to the prevailing dry conditions, high grassy fuel loads and cured grasslands across the Monaro Rural Fire District, the NSW RFS Deputy Commissioner has declared a variation based on the recommendation from the Snowy Monaro Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC), the Monaro Senior Leadership Team (SMT) and Brigade Captains.

As a result, the Bush Fire Danger Period for Snowy Monaro Local Government Area has been EXTENDED BY I MONTH, ENDING TUESDAY, 30 APRIL 2024, thus Permits will be required until this time.

MRCA Special General Meeting



Michelago Railway Station, 6 March. With a quorum well in excess of the required 10 members, the MRCA <u>adopted a new Constitution and updated its objectives</u>. These, with their rationales, had been widely publicised before the required 21 days' notice.

The following is an extract from the minutes of the meeting.

- 4. The Committee's recommendation, carried at the 13 February 2024 meeting, is:
 - 'That the MRCA Committee proposes that the Association adopt, by Special Resolutions, the Model Constitution for incorporated associations as recommended by NSW Fair Trading and a new set of objectives.'
- 5. Moved Di Fett, seconded Jo Gaha 'That the Michelago Region Community Association adopt the Model Constitution for incorporated associations.' CARRIED
- 6. Moved Di Fett, seconded John Rooney 'That the Michelago Region Community Association redefine its objectives as follows:
 - 1. The MRCA's objectives are to advocate and work
 - i) to support better social and economic outcomes for the Michelago region, and
 - ii) for the preservation of the Michelago region's heritage infrastructure and natural environment.
 - 2. The MRCA will pursue these objectives
 - by working collaboratively with other groups in Michelago and the Snowy Monaro region, and
 - ii) through open and inclusive communication.'

CARRIED

- 7. The President spoke of the need for new members on the MRCA Committee, particularly given the current executive is not planning to nominate again. She emphasised that any new executive would have support and advice from the current one if needed.
- 8. Kristen Reeson suggested that the functions of the office holders' roles be advertised prior to the August AGM.
- 9. Jo Gaha expressed thanks to the current MRCA Committee for raising the Association's achievements 'to a new level', especially in productive communication with Council and looking after community assets in a comprehensive way.

SMRC Draft Active Transport plan

Snowy Monaro Regional Council is seeking community input on a new draft Active Transport Plan, which proposes new footpath, trail and cycleway projects to improve and expand the region's existing pedestrian and cycling network.

The draft Plan has been developed on the back of community consultation undertaken in September 2023, which included a survey and a series of community workshops.

Members of the Snowy Monaro community provided valuable insight into the current condition of the region's shared path network, areas of concern, and suggestions for path extensions and new links.

This revised draft of the Active Transport Plan incorporates the feedback Council received from the community in 2023, setting out in order of priority a plan for new shared path infrastructure to enhance pedestrian and cycling connectivity.

Council invites the community to review the updated draft, and provide their feedback on the future of active transport in our region. This is an opportunity to identify any gaps in the proposal and offer further comment on works planned for towns and villages across the region. The draft Active Transport Plan will assist Council in pursuing funding opportunities for the construction of new pedestrian and cycling infrastructure, as prioritised in the Plan.




