The Council's published plan is to stop maintaining unsealed roads with less than 35 cars per day and sealed roads with less than 150 cars per day. This would mean that *no maintenance* would be done even when something goes wrong on the road.

We think that most roads around Michelago will fall below these thresholds. People need to tell Council that this plan is totally unacceptable.

What if flood damage makes your road impassable? General wear and tear? Access for the fire brigade, ambulances, school buses, yourselves? Property values? Legal liability if you fix the road yourself? <u>Give your comments via this link before 11.59pm</u>, Monday 3 June:

Michelago General Store 25 May: CMRC community consultation

Mayor Chris Hanna, Councillors Tanya Higgins, Narelle Davis and Tricia Hopkins, and Council staff Ashleigh Prowse and Gina McConkey gave their time and knowledge patiently and generously.



Approximately 80 people came and went during the advertised hours of 9 to 11. Questions, concerns and complaints kept councillors and council staff busy. There was plenty of printed information and many feedback forms were collected.



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Some people were surprised to find council staff just as concerned as residents about the financial situation, and seeking solutions with the least impact. Solutions are, of course, hard to find.



Local governments keep in touch with one another and it's no surprise that all councils are feeling the pinch. There are annual meetings of Local Government NSW (LGNSW), and the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA). There's also the Country Mayors' Conference and frequent individual meetings with politicians Steve Whan and Kristy McBain.



So, why do successive state and federal governments ignore the plight of regional NSW councils?

L: Good heavens, where is this road? It's in Queanbeyan Palerang shire. It's Burra Road, and it starts just over the border from Snowy Monaro shire.

Queanbeyan Palerang is approximately half the size of Snowy Monaro and has three times the population. That means a lot more ratepayers per km of road.

Council Corner – May update

Draft 2024-25 Budget

As most people will know, the draft 2024-25 Budget is out for consultation with the community, until 3 June 2024. Council has conducted numerous pop up meetings in towns and villages around the local government area.

On Saturday, many people joined us in the Michelago General Store to discuss some of the service reductions which are being proposed in an attempt to balance the budget (ie only do what we have funding to do).

Frustratingly, this includes Council doing NO MAINTENANCE on unsealed roads that get less than 35 cars daily on them, and sealed roads with less than 150. To put it in context, that would affect the roads that most Michelagoans use.

I would suggest that our roads are a daily necessity, not a 'nice to have', and that roads are the most important service council provided to people in rural areas. Without a safely navigable road, we are cut off from employment, education, health services, recreation, emergency services, friends and family.

As one of your local Councillors, I am doing all that I can to ensure that our roads are not going to be abandoned by Council. There has to be another way of spreading the cost over more roads. A compromise must be found. But make no mistake – the money will need to come from somewhere else.

I need as many people as possible to write in to Council giving your views about what should be SMRC's spending priorities and necessities, and what are the 'nice to haves' to you – that is, the (non-statutory) things we shouldn't fund.

Summary table of proposed changes

Proposed Service Changes 2024-2025

In previous years, Council has been spending more than the revenue coming in, which is not sustainable. The Council is making a concerted effort to reduce spending, increase revenue, and provide a balanced budget.

Some significant changes have occurred within Council since Council adopted the last suite of strategic planning documents. Council's integrated plans need to consider the impact of these and whether changes are needed in Council's strategic direction.

The Towards Excellence Project has been instrumental in identifying the services we provide to our community. It has helped us distinguish between our legislative obligations and non-regulatory services, often called 'nice to have' services.

The revised draft of the DP 2022-2026 identifies service changes and reductions that aims to improve Council's financial position, for which community feedback will be sought.




Welcome to Part 2 of our special series on Council's financial challenges.

This information provides important context for the community to understand how we compare to other councils in terms of rates and service levels. The facts are, our residential, farmland, and business rates sit well below many neighbouring council areas. Yet at the same time, we are currently providing more services on average than what's typical for a council our size.

This highlights the fundamental challenge: we have overcommitted ourselves with the services we provide for many years, beyond what our revenue income can cover. Over time, this has reduced our cash reserves, increased our operational and maintenance costs, and put simply, we are trying to do too much with too little.

As we approach our second year of the special rate variation, Council is not willing to increase rates beyond what has been approved. What we must do is look at the services we will provide into the future. Our financial deficit highlights that we cannot keep doing all we are doing, Challenging decisions must be made to rein in costs and build a more sustainable council.






Letter to *Monaro Post* 21/5 Dear Editor

What use is a local council if it does not maintain roads?

Roads are critical infrastructure. Motor vehicles are effectively the only form of transport in this region.

In Snowy Monaro, 65% of households use cars to get to work. The average for NSW is only 46%. And 64% of Snowy Monaro households own two or more cars – for NSW that figure is only 52%.



In spite of these facts, the Snowy Monaro Regional Council has apparently decided that half our roads are unnecessary evils and it will stop maintaining them. That's right! The Council's Operational Plan 2024-25 explains that it will maintain only 52% of sealed roads and 53% of unsealed roads.

If you are amongst the unfortunate residents who live on an unsealed road with less than 35 cars per day, your road will no longer be graded. Similarly, if you live on a sealed road with less than 150 cars per day your road will not be maintained.

There are no ifs, buts or maybes in the Council's plan that is out for consultation.

I would like to know if Council has consulted the school bus companies that drive our country kids to school every day, over unsealed roads that are already rough. Has Council consulted the emergency services? How far will roads deteriorate before an ambulance can't get to your property or home to save a life? *Kerry Rooney*

Hi MRCA Members and Friends

Mayor Chris Hanna and Deputy Mayor Tanya Higgins will be at the Michelago General Store this <u>Saturday 25 May from 9 – 11 am</u> to discuss the Council's proposed budget cuts and to hear from the community.

I encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity to have your say. Budget issues that are likely to affect the Michelago region include:

- Proposal to stop maintaining unsealed roads with less than 35 cars per day
- Proposal to stop maintaining sealed roads with less than 150 cars per day
- Abolition of the mobile library
- Reductions to roadside weed spraying
- Changes to mowing of recreational grounds and open spaces
- Abolition of the Donations and Sponsorships grant which has helped cover costs of maintaining the Michelago Railway Station over recent years.

Turning lanes off Monaro Hwy – coming campaign for road safety by MRCA

Everyone local knows what it's like to turn onto or off the highway, whether you're turning across traffic, or slowing down to exit on the left. And the traffic is getting heavier.

There have been scary experiences and near misses for years. Fatalities are a matter of time.

These roads need long, wide turning lanes: Willows, Cemetery, Clearview, Micalago, Mt Livingstone, Baroona. If you think your road should be on this list, please tell us by writing to <u>newsletter@michelagoregion.org.au</u>

The highway is the business of the NSW Government, not Council.

Next month, after submissions to Council about the proposed budget cuts are due, the MRCA will start campaigning for turning lanes for these side roads off the Monaro Highway.

MRCA Committee needs some new faces

First, please be a member: see p19. It's easy & cheap!

The current committee has achieved a lot for the community in the past few years.

President Di Fett does not plan to stand for re-election, but might stay on the committee.



Treasurer Kerry Rooney wants to relinquish the treasurer's role. She would assist as part of a new committee through support with the railway station, grant applications (currently the role of the treasurer) and lobbying on local government issues important to Michelago.

Secretary Leanne Pattison will not stand for this position again, but will continue producing the *Magpie* for the moment and will stay on the committee, including being the MRCA liaison with the Hall Committee.

Committee members without office (Sally Hughes, Tony De Salis, Peter Holland, Robbie Wood, Sam Walton) are considering their plans. It's hoped they'll continue to contribute.

In short, it's clear that the Michelago Region Community Association will need a new president, treasurer and secretary. As the association is incorporated, it's legally required to have people in these positions.

What is required of these positions?

- President: this is a leadership role. The president represents the MRCA.
- Treasurer: maintain up-to-date financial records and submit regular reports to the committee. Prepare annual financial statements. Apply for grants.
- <u>Secretary</u>: attend to agendas and minutes of meetings. It's important that these be done promptly. The association is publicly accountable.

The MRCA must have a minimum of three meetings per calendar year. The previous constitution required monthly meetings. Business can be transacted outside meetings, via telephone or other means.

Michelago Memorial Community Hall

The Hall Committee continues to maintain and improve this central community facility.

The solar battery has been installed. The acoustic panels project has been acquitted by President Naomi. Council has promised to fund an emergency power inlet, the mysteriously broken carpark bollard has been replaced by Council *(see left)*, some heater elements need to be



replaced, and a cleaning fee for large events will be added to the hall's hire fee. Hall hire rates are on p16.

There's now 'how to use the hall' information posted in the kitchen. This includes instructions about the pump and the solar system. It will be sent with hiring info, too. Thank you, Naomi.

<u>The annual SMRC Donations and Sponsorships Grants will finish</u> <u>this year</u>. This is a casualty of the necessary budget cuts. Last year, the Hall's grant partially funded the dishwasher and its installation. This year, the Hall Committee applied for money for

a new name-sign above the portico (the present one is old and sad) and for materials to paint the patched wall (right-hand side from the entrance). Council has funded the full quote: \$1458.62. It even includes sandpaper.

Here is a belated thank-you to Allan for installing the timber supports for the new acoustic curtains: thank you, Allan!

If there were a bin at the oval, emptying it would be another volunteer job.



Michelago Railway Station

Donations and Sponsorships Grant: this yearly funding opportunity has long been an essential support for the station's rental from UGL (and previously from John Holland) and for the costs of electricity, which have increased for everyone. It has also helped to cover maintenance costs.

The MRCA's 2024 application for \$2,000.00 with the project title 'Community access to Michelago Railway Station' has been granted. Due to Council's budget cuts, this is the last year of the scheme.



This will make it more important for the MRCA to look for some new fundraising opportunities.

The station has been maintained and improved in recent years, thanks to much volunteer activity. It has become increasingly favoured as a venue for community activities and is often visited by the large number of people interested in historic buildings.

Magpie readers are aware of the recent grant of \$17,000 from the NSW Historic Society, an amount generously promised to be matched by UGL. Two craftsmen (a plasterer and a carpenter) skilled in historic restoration and recommended by consultant Pip Giovanelli (see *Magpie22*) are expected to be contracted by UGL.

New fence for the oval?



The MRCA is applying for a Boco Rock Community Enhancement Fund grant for a new fence for the western (creek) side of the oval and obtained quotes from two expert local fencers.

A 1.8 metre high fence is proposed, to extend from the northern end of the green shed to the cricket nets, and to incorporate a farm gate near the shed (for vehicles) and a pedestrian gate about half-way along.

This proposal has the enthusiastic support of the Michelago Cricket Club (MCC), the members of which anticipate an end to players hitting sixes into the creek or its weedy surrounds. Cynics (realists?) anticipate that a new fence will just provide an enticing challenge for big hitters.

Whatever the case, it would stop many balls being lost and be a vast visual and safety improvement.

An up-to-date fence with the two gates would also anticipate development on the creek side. Such development is tentatively planned by Landcare and is a feature of the Michelago Master Plan (remember this?).

The plan is to call it The Dave Hanns Fence.

However, there is no guarantee that, even if the grant application were to be successful, current heritage and environment regulations would allow the fence to be built. Let's hope bureaucracy sees civic sense.

Tennis clubhouse improvement, too?

Included in the above grant application for the new fence is a smaller one for partial lining of the clubhouse's open room walls.

The back wall and the inside of the front half-walls need lining with corrugated steel, as are the two side walls. At present, they are lined with foil, which is easily damaged (and has been in one section).




In November 2022, Boco Rock funded a new ceiling covering the rafters, thus stopping bird poo droppings. (See *Magpie10*, p7.) As a result, the open room has at last been used for meetings and by tennis players.



The only other formal business was to vote for the purchase of a ride-on mower. This would save Liam from transporting his machine to the cemetery to mow the c.1.5 hectares. The cemetery land also extends up the hill – plenty of room left.

Where to house the mower? There might be sufficient funds to buy a small shipping container. It was wistfully observed that the Bredbo cemetery has a proper shed for equipment – ride-on mower, whipper snipper and other tools.

In a lively meeting about housing the dead, there were some local history highlights and anecdotes. Here are some.

Facts

- Ron has been chairperson for 33 years. The meeting thanked Ron for his service.
- Before Ron's long tenure, Bill Cotter (Liam's father) was chairperson and Ron was treasurer. Before Bill Cotter, Ray Coffey (Ron's father) was chairman.
- As the new chairperson, Liam is continuing a community tradition. The meeting speculated that he was also establishing a family one.
- Ron complimented Liam on his meticulous record-keeping of cemetery finances.
- Liam has been treasurer for 'a long time'.
- By Council OHS decree, graves are now dug with a back-hoe instead of the back-stressing labour of locals. Against long tradition, the decree also forbids people to fill in the grave. This was ignored at Dave Hanns' recent funeral, when shovels were provided for the many who wanted to follow custom. (Prohibitions coming on digging one's own garden?)
- You can buy a burial plot from Council for \$400, but that's just a booking fee you have to pay the balance after your death.
- The graveyard was segregated: Catholics here, Protestants there. This might (ie it's not necessarily a fact) reflect the more active sectarianism of former days, from both brands, and the preponderance of Irish settlers.

<u>Anecdotes</u>

- There used to be many Michelago boarding houses and eight 'pubs' in the 1800s as essential support to all the hopeful hunters for alluvial gold with claims along the river.
- There was a bloke, possibly called Simpson, who was fatally struck by lightning a way south along the Monaro Highway. His family erected a handsome gravestone somewhere down near the bottom end of the cemetery. Alas, it was destroyed by lightning. Ron Coffey and Bill Cotter, advanced recyclers, stuck it back together. The resurrection job was also the victim of a lightning strike. Ron and Bill, reading the heavenly room, took the hint and left it alone.
- In the days when locals would dig the grave, there was one that wasn't quite big enough for the coffin. Apparently, someone had to put their boot to the box for 'a bloody good shove' to push it in.
- A coffin was once not put in quite straight. It went in sideways, opened and the body fell out: 'There were men there who you'd never thought would cry ...'
- There were the two McMahon girls who'd been to a dance at a local boarding house (later Russell Cotter's residence). It was a moonlit night and they decided they'd walk home via a shortcut through the cemetery. Two blokes got wind of this, covered themselves with white sheets and pranced around behind a gravestone. When the girls recovered (legend does not say how long this took), they swore blind there had been three figures.
