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Dangerous intersections with Monaro Highway need turning lanes

Now that the bridge is a done deal, MRCA is turning its focus to a campaign for safer, wider verges and turning lanes at intersections with the Monaro Highway. Action? See p4.


Clearview Road has no pullover room for cars to turn right safely from the highway.



Above: The circled black car, brake lights and indicator on, wants to turn right into Clearview Rd. It must wait in the middle of the highway for northbound oncoming traffic to pass, as there is only a half-car width on the left of the left-hand white line. Meanwhile, cars behind it bank up or, as here, squeeze past on the left. They sometimes rashly pass on the right of a car that's waiting to turn right. They sometimes mistake the turning car's right indicator as a driver's signal to pass on the right. Further, turning right out of Clearview Rd has no safe zone on the other side.

There needs to be a truck's width safety lane on BOTH sides of the highway for cars to enter and exit all side roads. See next page ...

Further to the p1 photo, there's a steep bank on the left of that view, so a car having to urgently pull into that narrow space is in further danger.



L: Cars exiting Clearview Rd to turn right need a safety lane to pull into on the other side of the highway when there's heavy traffic.



The highway is increasingly busy. On Fridays and Sundays there's to-and-fro coast traffic. Ski season is a nightmare. The Monaro is a major artery for trucks. They're all doing 100+ kph.

Above R: The Pony Club Rd (aka Cemetery Rd) exit/entrance is just as bad as Clearview Rd's.



The ground view from the Clearview Rd intersection also shows no room for cars from the north to wait on the left for safe turning into Clearview.



<u>Trucks</u> can obscure the indicator light on a turning car from traffic behind. In a recent incident, an impatient SUV passed such a truck that was slowing behind a southbound car turning right into Clearview. The turning car had a narrow escape and the driver a frightening experience. There have been many such incidents.

<u>Micalago Rd</u>: given there are over 50 households on Micalago Road (plus those on Karinya Plains Rd), its intersection with the Monaro Highway should be urgently upgraded with the addition of dedicated turning lanes.

<u>Funding is available</u> for safety upgrades to the Monaro Highway – announcements have been made by Steve Whan, member for Monaro and Jenny Aitchison, Minister for Regional Transport and Roads.

However, all the funding to date has been provided to Bredbo, Cooma, Nimmitabel and Bombala. Our northern end of the Monaro Highway has been totally neglected. See Steve Whan's April media release here Work to start on more major Monaro Highway safety upgrades (stevewhan.com.au)

Cars turning into and out of <u>Micalago Road</u> have a slightly wider, but insufficient, area than those in Clearview Rd. There is insufficient safety lane room on either side. When they turn north into heavier traffic than here shown, they must dash to the very narrow opposite side to wait for northbound traffic to pass.

Mt Livingstone Road:




The issues are the same here.
Turning out of or into Mt
Livingstone Rd in either
direction is dangerous when
there is other traffic. Note the
gravel verge.





Other intersections have a slightly widened verge, but often gravel. Baroona Rd has better turning lanes, though short, but is situated on a crest, so is well known as a frightening spot. That road should enter the highway further down the hill.



L: <u>Contrast Poveys Rd</u>. Its sealed turn-in lane is c.200m long.

R: <u>Contrast</u> Bumbalong Rd. Its sealed turn-in lane is even longer than Poveys Rd's. Also, it's at least as wide as a whole lane in the actual highway.

That is to say, drive towards Cooma and see road safety improving.

Michelago is the poor relation in the shire family.

<u>The MRCA has initiated a letter writing campaign</u> to our parliamentary representatives with the cooperation of residents on some of the affected roads. Anyone not involved in that campaign could also write to Steve Whan, local Member for Monaro << monaro@parliament.nsw.gov.au >>

Another target for letters urging action is Jenny Aitchison, the NSW Minister for Regional Transport and Roads – you will have to upload your letter on line here and complete the online form:

<u>Multiple letters from residents</u> will certainly have more impact with the politicians than just one letter from your community association. One resident actually had a phone-call response from Steve Whan's office.

Here are some ideas that you could consider including in your letters:

- Ask for urgent upgrades to intersections
- Tell them how many residents or households are on your road
- Describe the intersection of your road with the Monaro Highway and the shortcomings
- The behaviour of through traffic (cars, trucks, caravans) on the highway
- The increasing traffic on the highway
- Visibility
- Dangers and/or frightening incidents you've experienced
- In addition to safe turning lanes, you could ask for an 80 kph speed limit, north and south
 of the Ryrie St turnoff to the village, and this to include the highway from Willows Rd to
 Micalago Rd.

Unless we speak up, the people of Michelago will continue to be overlooked by the politicians.

SMRC budget & roads MRCA spoke up loudly for the maintenance of Michelago's roads.

MRCA lodged a submission with Council arguing for equitable treatment of rural roads: see it on www.michelagoregion.org.au/topics/ It also

- lobbied the Mayor at the consultation session
- assisted residents with their submissions
- was interviewed and quoted about roads in articles by The Monaro Post and About Regional << https://aboutregional.com.au/snowy-monaro-council-proposes-to-abandon-maintenance-of-low-traffic-roads/452220/>>
- was interviewed about roads by ABC Radio South East (which broadcasts into the Cooma region)
- encouraged residents to write letters to the Editor, The Monaro Post.

We're still waiting to see the final decision on roads coming out of the 27 July budget meeting. Minutes are yet to be published. We don't know how Michelago region roads are classified.

The recommendations that went to Councillors included:

- 1. Change the service level of preventative maintenance for gravel road maintenance so that:
 - (a) Regional and collector roads will receive a maintenance grade on an annual basis
 - (b) <u>Local</u> roads will receive a maintenance grade each <u>two years</u>

- (c) Minor access roads will receive a maintenance grade each three years or as required.
- 2. Change the service level for the unsealed road network maintenance so that:
 - (a) Failures across the road network that remove two wheel drive access currently in existence will be addressed
 - (b) Safety risks assessed under the Council's risk management framework as extreme risks across the network will be addressed
 - (c) Failures across the network other than as set out above will be prioritised based on risk and usage and be addressed only when it is considered funds will remain available at the end of the financial year.

Cr Higgins commented on her Facebook page, 29.6.24:

'Roads are now treated appropriately in this new draft budget. All roads will receive regular maintenance, and repairs will be triaged appropriately.

Thank you everyone who used their voice to highlight the importance of road access in rural areas.

And a massive thank you to the Hon Kristy McBain, as the significant increase to the Roads to Recovery grant has allowed Council to better fund its road network for the next four years. As your Labor Councillors, Councillor Lynda Summers and I have used every opportunity to advocate hard for improved road funding to rural councils – Kristy has listened, and delivered for us.

Revisions to the draft Budget are a direct outcome of Council staff, Councillors, our local members and the community working together. It's powerful stuff.'

AGM of MRCA — Why should we care? Why should we attend? Please read on ... 27 July, 3pm, Michelago Railway Station

Committees have come and gone for many years and have achieved a lot for Michelago. They have focused on different things but have always been comprised of community members who have had Michelago interests at heart.

Now we need some new people on the committee – see the end of this article.

What has this committee done?

<u>Finances</u>: We are a very small organisation and our revenue is mainly derived from grants which the Committee has worked very hard to win and to implement for the Michelago community.

- We have fully acquitted the 2021 bushfire grant which provided \$78,000 for the BBQ facilities at the Michelago Oval and paid for initial issues of the Michelago Magpie, marquees, heaters, chairs and tables as well as a number of community BBQs, events and dinners.
- We have successfully applied for the following grants: 2023 SMRC Donations and Sponsorships \$1500, Essential Energy \$2750, NSW Heritage Grant \$17,000 with matched funding from UGL of \$16,390, 2024 SMRC Donations and Sponsorships \$2000. Total: \$39,640. These grants are assisting with the maintenance of the Michelago railway station, including Heritage NSW approved upgrades, and its operating costs.
- We continue to apply for grants and the latest is an application to the Boco Rock Enhancement Fund to improve the fence at the Michelago Oval and provide some modest signage to recognise local cricket heroes, Dave Hanns and Clive Kelly.
- To help out the Michelago Memorial Hall, we applied for a grant on their behalf to improve the acoustics in the Hall. We were successful in getting a \$9,925 grant for the Hall in 2023.
- This committee has not organised any fundraising fairs, despite occasional requests. Briefly, the reasons are (a) the enormous amount of time and work involved and (b) increasing restrictions by insurance companies. (See *Magpie 24* for a full account.) The Car-Boot Sale last year at St Patrick's Church was a small-scale, fairly successful event, though.

Other community action:

- In response to our request, members donated \$515 to the Hooley Fire Appeal BBQ in 2024.
- The Ryrie St-Micalago Rd bridge is at last being built, thanks to continued pressure from the MRCA in collaboration with Cr Tanya Higgins, who has networked and pressured tirelessly to continue the groundwork of former Cr John Rooney. Not everyone in Ryrie St is happy about increased traffic, but the bridge is essential to join the two parts of the township.
- The *Michelago Magpie* is a voice for the community, representing various events and interests. It was started in response to many requests for a newsletter.

- The railway station, Michelago's main heritage building, has been cared for and improved, becoming more of a venue for community events.
- There is now a new website for community and visitor information. Same address as the old one: www.michelagoregion.org.au Thanks to Markus Buchhorn for setting it up. We are gradually adding to it. Minutes of MRCA committee meetings are on it as public documents. All issues of the Magpie and of previous newsletters are also posted.
- The new constitution (see *Magpie 25*) for incorporated associations is established by the NSW Fair Trading Act. It's relevant and automatically updated.

And so to the AGM, 27 July, 3pm at the Michelago Railway Station

<u>The committee needs new members</u>. The President (Di Fett) and the Secretary (Leanne Pattison) will stand down. The Treasurer (Kerry Rooney) would very much like a change in jobs.

The President is a leadership role. The Secretary's essential job is timely presentation of agendas and minutes. The Treasurer needs to keep financial records – some book-keeping skills are all that's necessary. Non-office holder committee roles are supportive and often bring their own initiatives to discuss.

It's up to each committee to decide what it will do. Activities all depend on available time and commitment. All members of this committee have shared jobs collaboratively and with goodwill.

Di, Kerry and Leanne will stay on to give support.

Leanne is willing to continue the *Michelago Magpie* for the foreseeable future (how far she can see is another matter).



Farewell to Russell Cotter

17 May 1941 - 13 June 2024

St Patrick's Catholic Church, Michelago, 27 June 2024

Eulogy by his niece, Trish Thomson R: The Russell many of us remember.

'Vincent Russell Garrett was born in Cooma hospital on 17 May 1941 to parents Vincent and Margaret Cotter. Russell's siblings were John (later known as Fr Mel), Patricia, Kathleen, Moya and Agnes, my

mother. My Mum coincidentally passed away on this day 8 years ago and Russell passed away on his dear Mum's anniversary, 13 June.

Russell lived in Michelago for 78 years. He was an expert rabbit trapper, fox and kangaroo shooter. He was an excellent shot — one shot, one kill. When brown snakes snuck out from under the house, the outdoor loo, hayshed or wherever, their lives ended that day. He taught me how to shoot when I was about 8. He would string up empty tin cans in the apple tree. The slug gun was off-sight, so I had to learn to aim down and to the left. Russell was a good teacher but my only victims were tin cans.

Russell never had a drivers licence. Instead, he rode horses in his younger years, drove his old Fergie tractor, walked everywhere and then he got his pride and joy, a Yamaha quad bike. He managed to dice with death, illegally crossing the busy Monaro Highway 4 to 6 times a day, often with his 303 strapped on. He would drive through the creek, park the quad and walk up to the shop to buy his newspapers, have coffee and lunch.



At the annual Michelago Fair, Russell would give demonstrations of his stock whip cracking expertise. He was also the unofficial cemetery weed sprayer, a task he took quite seriously.

You may have noticed the photo of Russell all dressed up (at left) — he was an extra in the 1999 movie Passion: the story of Percy Grainger, who was a poet and musician, filmed in the UK, Sydney, Canberra and here at Michelago Railway Station! Blink and you will miss him, but he was thrilled to be involved and he was proud of those photos.



For the past 5 years, Russell lived at Heritage Care in Queanbeyan, where he received exceptionally good care, with all staff treating him with kindness, patience and respect. The highlight of Russell's day was receiving his newspapers. He enjoyed letting staff know the current prices of beef and lamb. Up until the last 6 months, he was still winning the weekly carpet bowls games and enjoyed playing cards with other residents.

Russell first entered Heritage for respite care and was in a shared room with one other man named Max. They each had a TV. Russell was wait-listed for a single room, which he was offered after about 6 months. When I got the phone call about the single room, I went

straight to see it. It was just around the corner from his current room. I thought it was great and could picture him being comfortable there with space for his books and wall space for his pictures. Russell looked at the room and said he was happy to move, so I completed the paperwork on the spot. Staff planned to move him that afternoon. A few hours later, I received a flustered phone call to say 'Russell won't move.' I asked to speak to him and asked what the problem was. He said 'I'm not leaving Max. I press the bell when he needs help.' So he remained there with Max.


Visiting Russell in his room could sometimes be a headache, literally. Max is from Albania, has dementia and very limited English. He would have his TV on the Albanian 24-hour news channel at maximum volume and Russell would have his TV on The Price is Right, or some other noisy show, also at maximum volume! I think you get the picture. It was the battle of the remote controls, specifically the volume buttons!

Russell's best mate was David Hanns, who very sadly passed away suddenly in March. We were here in this beautiful church for his funeral. Unfortunately, Russell was too unwell to attend. I think Dave grew impatient waiting for Russell to join him so they could resume their mateship, with beers, on the other side. I truly believe Dave came down at 10.30pm on 13 June and said 'Come on, Russ! Come with me!' They are now reunited in Heaven, sharing/fighting over the crown of The Mayor of Michelago.

Application to fund the oval's fence and complete the clubhouse lining

This is the application for Boco Rock funding for the Dave Hanns fence at the Michelago Oval and to complete the lining of the tennis clubhouse next to the tennis courts.

Magpie hasn't published applications before. This one is published to show the thought and time that goes into stating a persuasive case for official bodies with money to give some to us.

The case must be stated strongly – there are many other community bodies applying for limited funds.

There are three elements to the project: 1. To construct a 1.8 metre high netting fence on the western side of the cricket oval. The current fence does not stop balls from being hit into the neighbouring paddock and creek. The fence will be in memory of Dave Hanns, late President of the Michelago Cricket Club and former team captain who died suddenly this year just weeks after Michelago won the premiership of the ACT Sunday social competition. Dave had been lobbying locally for a new fence and his team and community wishes to proceed with it. Dave was a charismatic and colourful character, very well known throughout the Michelago community and very popular with his cricket team and many other mates who used to gather at his informal men's shed in the village. 2. To install two signs at the oval. One sign will display the new name of the oval, ie Clive Kelly Oval after the local cricketing legend following Council's recent decision and community consultation process. The other sign will be placed on the new fence in memory of Dave Hanns. 3. To line the two external walls of the central viewing area in tennis clubhouse with corrugated steel. This will protect the existing fragile lining while keeping most of the historical timber posts and supports visible. The tennis courts and clubhouse are co-located with the cricket oval.

Explain how your project delivers improvements to the community (required):

Michelago has had a cricket club since the mid to late 1800s. We have been playing cricket at the present oval since the 1920s/30s after the land was donated to Council for a playing field by the Kelly family. The tennis courts, originally on Ryrie St were then relocated to the oval precinct. What was originally a cricket pavillion for spectators was moved from the northern end of the oval, to the southern end and became a tennis shed and more recently extended with the addition of a kitchen and toilet facilities (another MRCA project) and now optimistically renamed a Tennis Clubhouse. Our recreation facilities in Michelago are limited. But they have all been supplied by the generosity, hard work and enthusiasm of our small local community. We would like to celebrate this heritage, by recognising two local heroes. We want to honour a legendary local cricketer, Clive Kelly, whose father and uncle donated the land for the oval and Dave Hanns, a recent local hero who championed the Michelago Cricket Club over the last twenty years. Communities should have pride in their local heroes. The upgrade to our oval precinct through the addition of a fence, signage and minor upgrades to the Tennis Clubhouse are long overdue.

Explain how the project will support local economic development (if applicable):

This project is about a minor but important improvement to our our sports infrastructure. Visiting cricket teams would contribute to local businesses and therefore have a beneficial effect on economic development.

However as outlined in the Michelago Master Plan, a boardwalk or walking path is anticipated to run beside Michelago Creek which would include the corridor next to the cricket oval. Should our fencing project receive funding from Boco Rock, we will have a gate through the fence to allow Landcare and the local community to access the creek area and to start upgrading it with weeding and planting. This will make Michelago a more desirable place to live and work in the future.

In addition the Council is currently installing a new bridge on Ryrie Street to connect the village with Micalago Road, thus providing a route for traffic to explore the village. Beautification of the creek corridor will entice more people to visit and spend money locally which in turn will lead to business development.

Explain how the project will support local tourism development (if applicable):

In the short term there may be little effect on tourism development. However Michelago is located within 30 minutes drive of Tuggeranong and 40 minutes drive to Cooma. We already have many tourists who stop at the Railway Station - everyday they stop there for lunch or a rest. The railway station is directly across the street from the cricket oval. With this fencing project, we hope to open up the creek area to easier access. We will collaborate with Landcare which has plans to remove weeds and plant native vegetation beside the Michelago Creek adjoining the cricket oval. That will increase the attractiveness of our village for tourists. Every journey commences with a few small steps.

Michelago Region Community Association has delivered many grant projects successfully. For example, we received a Boco Rock grant in 2019 and managed a \$30,000 project of maintenance and upgrades to the Michelago Railway Station. In 2023 we successfully completed another major project - a Bushfire Community Resilience and Recovery Fund project worth over \$70,000. This involved the construction of barbeque facilities, shelters and seating at the Michelago oval as well as a series of community events to assist recovery after the horrendous fires of 2019-20. MRCA applied for the grant and managed the construction project. We are a resilient little community and we do know how to deliver.

The Michelago Railway Station is maintained largely by grants gained by the MRCA. The Hall Committee's many projects to improve the Hall in the last couple of years have been paid for more by grants and fund-raising events than hire fees.

The Boco Rock Fund is independent of Council. Be assured that its money doesn't disadvantage our roads.





Help keep the Upper Bidgee (upstream of the ACT) Redfin-free!

Redfin perch are a popular recreational fishing species and are even regarded as a 'good eating fish'. But Redfin perch are also an introduced species which carry the EHN virus. Once Redfin numbers increase in a waterway the EHN virus can be magnified to levels that can spill over to other fish species including Murray and Trout cod, Macquarie perch, Galaxias, silver perch and trout. The virus is particularly devastating for Macquarie perch (affectionately also referred to as the 'Macca'). In fact EHN is so devastating to the Macca that it has ceased to persist in all waterways where Redfin are present.

Up to now, Redfin have been found in Canberra's urban lakes and upper Murrumbidgee River downstream of the ACT border. Recently, however, there has been talk that Redfin have been found in the upper Murrumbidgee upstream of the ACT. A Redfin incursion in this part of the catchment will have severe consequences for both these fish species.

Last year the UMDR ran several angling days, where recreational fishers targeted sites where Redfin have been found and area where there was favoured habitat. Luckily, none were detected but we need people to be on the look-out. If a Redfin perch is found in our waterways, please get in touch or report it via the Feral Fish Scan website or app (see link below).

Our community can also help to keep the Upper Bidgee Redfin free by making sure Redfin perch are not transferred to our area whether as live bait or stocking into farm dams. The problem with farm dams is that Redfin can spread downstream if the dam spills. This is how Redfin were originally transferred to the Canberra Region. If Redfin are present in a farm dam upstream of the ACT we would love to know because it is still possible to contain the pest by treating the dam before they spread further downstream.

Cemetery update – lightning does strike twice

Following great interest in the *Magpie 27* report on the Michelago Cemetery Committee's AGM and associated stories (some verified), two reporters sought and found the blasted headstone featured in the story about a man possibly called Simpson.

We hate to spoil a good story, but the truth *appears* to be a little different. First, his surname was Evans.

The grave is near the cemetery's highway boundary. Clearly, there's one broken headstone, but two? We think a second lightning strike on the headstone is unlikely, but ...

The original story in 1921 was reported across Australia in over 25 newspapers. Young Jack died while out rabbiting on Micalago Station. The family lived in Michelago village and when he didn't come home for tea, his brothers went out to search for him. They found his body under a large tree that had been shattered by a lightning strike.



Jack Evans was the baby of the family, the youngest of ten. Imagine the horror of his family when he was struck by lightning and killed at just 18 years of age.

Young Jack was buried in the Michelago Cemetery. What happened next is hard to believe. His headstone was struck by lightning and shattered to pieces!

In this version of the story, a new headstone was erected. In the photo, you can see some large shards and the base of the original headstone.

The inscription on the present headstone reads:

In loving memory of Leslie Allen John, beloved son of R & E Evans
Killed by lightning 21 Jan 1921.
Aged 18 years

"He bade no one a last farewell, He waved his hand to none. His spirit flew before we knew That from us he was gone."

Inserted by his parents, brothers and sisters.

Historical headstones



R: Here's a sad one.

Little Garrett was born 30 March 1870 and died 20 April 1870.

There's a wealth of stories in the Michelago Cemetery.

In what might be called Cotter Corner, where Russell Vincent Garrett Cotter was laid to rest, Cotters abound (or, rather, lie).

L: The original Garrett (it's clearly a family name), born 1802, came from County Cork to NSW in 1822 and died in Michelago in 1886.



More local history: the innkeeper that built a church and his visit from the Clarke gang Kerry Rooney

Thomas Kennedy acquired land in Micalago in 1853 and with his wife, Mary Maher, opened an inn a few years later.

Although the local population was still small, Micalago needed a church as well as an inn. The Kennedys had a solution. They not only donated the land, but Thomas also built a small stone church and in 1865 St Patrick's opened just down the road from the Hibernian Inn.

MICALAGO. (FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

MARCH 30 .- Great regret has been ex pressed here for the death of the late Mr Thomas Kennedy, as he was an old and respected resident of the district. Mr Kennedy came to this district about a quarter of a century ago and ever since he has been in public business, and all who had business transactions with him speak of him as an upright, honest man, perhaps it will not be out of place to mention that the ground on which the Roman the ground on which the Roman Catholic church is built here was the gift of the late Mr Kennedy.

The weather has been very dry for the past few weeks until to day we had a few showers which will refreshen the grass.

The local parishioners paid off the debt owing to Thomas for the church's construction.

At around the same time, the Ryrie family of Micalago catered to the needs of the Anglican population and built the weatherboard church of St Thomas. (Magpie will do a feature on this charming little building later.)

On 1 June 1866, Micalago made headlines across the Australian colonies when the notorious Clarke gang bailed up the Kennedy's inn, rounded up the locals, mainly women and children, and held them all at gunpoint.

Some of the bushrangers then went across the road to rob and vandalise Levy's general store and assaulted the shopkeeper working there. Afterwards, they forced their captives to help them drink the bar dry, before riding off with their booty to their hideout at Jingera in the Tinderry Mountains.

Here is an excerpt from a long report of the event in the *Queanbeyan Age and General Advertiser*:

Early in the evening, about dusk, four horsemen were seen to come down from the direction of the Tinderras, and leaping the fences just below the Roman Catholic church, to pursue their way steadily through the street or road to the Queanbeyan end of the township.

Here they commenced their systematic sticking-up. The first house they approached was Mrs Lenane's, a widow, and ordering her and a labouring man in her employ to march before them, they proceeded further.

The next place they visited was Reddan's, whom they also ordered on before them. They then called at the lockup, and senior constable Moran's wife being the only person there, she was added to the number of their prisoners.

Finally they reached Kennedy's Inn, where they left their prisoners in charge of one of the Connells.

The Hibernian Inn, still standing beside the Monaro Highway today, was built in 1872 and became the second building of the same name to house the Kennedy's inn-keeping business.

Thomas Kennedy died in 1875 at the age of 55 and Mary retained ownership of the business until her death in 1894, aged 82. After various owners, the property was sold to the De Salis family around 1900 and renamed Soglio.
