



SMRC elections 14 September – Meet the Michelago candidates

Michelago is the northernmost region of the Snowy Monaro Shire. It's sometimes described as the tail-end (or less politely). Some folk further south in the shire even see Michelago more as a quasi-suburb of Canberra.

The same attitude was present in the further reaches of Yarrowlumla (now Palerang) Shire when we were part of that.

Therefore, we have been fortunate to have had four councillors promoting Michelago interests in recent years.

Way back, before amalgamations, <u>Vern Drew</u> was a Yarrowlumla Shire Councillor from September 1999 to February 2004. <u>Martin Hughes</u> was a Cooma Monaro Councillor 2008–2016 (two hard-working terms). He's especially remembered for the walking track around the Clive Kelly Oval (see *Magpie 25*, pp13–14), when Tony Robinson was MRCA President.

More recently, Councillor <u>John Rooney</u> (2016–2020, inaugural Mayor of Snowy Monaro Regional Council) energetically promoted Michelago and started the bridge process. Councillor <u>Tanya Higgins</u> (the most recent Deputy Mayor of SMRC) has just completed her first term, rivalling John in energy and achievement, including pushing the bridge to completion.

<u>We are lucky!</u> Both Tanya and John are standing for this election as SMRC Councillors. While councillors do take responsibility for the whole shire, two people standing up for Michelago would be a force.

Both Michelago candidates made the bridge happen – John started it and Tanya finished it. They worked for grant funding and they pushed and lobbied and nagged ... and kept it up.

Magpie is careful to be apolitical and promotes these two candidates solely because they're both from Michelago and have shown strong commitment to it, while still shouldering their responsibilities for the whole region.

Magpie tossed a coin to decide their order of appearance below.

John Rooney

Group G – John Rooney's Blue Team

I have assembled a team of independents and friends: Group G - John Rooney's Blue team, to offer voters a centre-right choice. The Liberal Party is not fielding any endorsed candidates in Snowy Monaro. The Blue Team will cooperate with other Councillors of goodwill to achieve the best outcomes for Michelago and the Snowy Monaro.

We want Council to put the brakes on rates by cutting wasteful expenditure and focusing on better roads and bridges, more efficient rubbish collection, cleaner water and safer sewerage treatment.

How good is The Bridge!

So many people are saying it and it's not a question. Especially Micalago Road residents who can now use the relatively safer Ryrie St intersection to enter and exit the Monaro Hwy, as well as having easier access to the General Store, Memorial Hall, Burra and Tinderry Rds and friends in the central village. Dogs can now walk their humans across the creek to explore the extended delights of Micalago Rd.

It's not perfect for everybody, of course: increased village traffic is not to everyone's taste, and there's no footpath.

This latter item is a concern and the 'shared space' sign to traffic is a minimal safety measure. Maybe it can be addressed another time. Apparently, footpath construction on the high (eastern) side, with an essential safety railing, would have exceeded the available funds and there isn't room on the other side.

Still, we have the bridge that so many (especially the Michelago Fire Brigade) wanted and for which Councillors John Rooney and Tanya Higgins, supported by the MRCA, worked persistently.

Shout-outs all round!

Micalago Rd resident Emily Green (above) has been one of the strong supporters of the bridge campaign. Now she doesn't have to brave the Micalago Rd and Ryrie St highway intersections to drive her children to school and collect them afterwards. Now they can ride their bikes to and from. Hers is just one of the families happy about the safer route.

What is the Boco Rock Community Enhancement Fund?

The MRCA and the Memorial Hall Committee are grateful to this fund for many improvements to community facilities over the years. Many people have asked 'What *is* this strangely named Boco Rock thing?'

Full details of the fund are on the Snowy Monaro Regional Council website, which includes this statement:

'The Boco Rock Community Enhancement Fund is a condition of the State Government approved Boco Rock Wind Farm project. The funding operates on an annual timetable and is offered once a year to eligible applicants whose project or event will benefit the Snowy Monaro.'

The fund is independent of other SMRC finances, including rate payments.

The Dave Hanns Fence is a goer

The 1.8 metre fence on the creek side of the Michelago Oval (aka the Clive Kelly Oval) will be built, thanks to funding from the Boco Rock Community Enhancement fund.

Kerry Rooney's persuasive application (published in *Magpie 28,* pp12–13) has secured this grant, to the delight of cricketers who will lose fewer of their balls in the creek land or, alternatively, will face an extra challenge to hit a six either into the lovegrass jungle or into the creek, depending on the water level.

There will be a gate for access to the creek land, too, so those wishing to ramble among the wombat and rabbit holes won't have to negotiate the trailing barbed wire of the present fence (see *Magpie 27*, p13). →

This gate will also give access, one day, to the public path approved in the Michelago Master Plan. (For more on the MMP and the need for Council to attend to it, see *Magpie 29* about the proposed development at 1 Ryrie St, i.e. the old inn's land).




The fence will also benefit the oval's aesthetics, complementing the MRCA barbecues and seats, the playground and the improved open room in the tennis clubhouse.

The Michelago Cricket Club (MCC) has long desired such a fence, but is not an incorporated body, so could not apply to the Boco Rock Fund. As the MRCA *is* incorporated, it was able to do this for the MCC and the community.

Michelago Landcare has plans for some re-vegetation on the creek side of the fence. The new gate will facilitate the project.



Not only but also ... the tennis clubhouse



Lining of the two unlined walls in the clubhouse's viewing room is also funded in this Boco Rock grant. The back wall and the front half-wall will be covered with corrugated metal like that on the side wall visible here.

Magpie readers will recall – and clubhouse users are grateful for – the ceiling installed in November 2022 to cover the birds' perchand-poo rafters (see Magpie 10). This was also paid for by the Boco Rock Fund after a grant application by the Memorial Hall Committee.

The bird poo-stained chairs eventually found a new home. The wooden benches, both fixed and portable, provide sufficient seating and fit the clubhouse style.

Colinton Rural Fire Brigade



Colinton Brigade's area covers the southern part of Michelago, an area of 25, 177 hectares (61,787 acres) of the Monaro. Its boundaries are from Clearview Rd in the north, Clear Range to the west, Calabash to the east and Gungoandra Creek to the south.

Its monthly training is on the second Saturday of each month from 1pm at the Fire Shed at 4574 Monaro Hwy Colinton. All are welcome.

Magpie comments: Colinton is part of the marvellous Monaro network of volunteer firefighters and often works with the Michelago Brigade. Many

of us have cause to be very grateful to both these brigades in particular. This is not to forget Bredbo, Anembo, Smiths Road, Guises Creek, Burra ... and any others not mentioned here.



Blessing of the Fleet

1 September, 10am, Michelago Railway Station



Fire trucks and firefighters from Michelago, Burra, Jerrabomberra, Colinton, Guises Creek and Smiths Road brigades gathered at the Michelago Railway Station on a sunny, windy morning for the pre fire-season blessing and a barbecue.

More than 50 people gathered on and around the station platform to hear two addresses and later to mingle around the trucks and the barbecue.





The Reverend Paul Cohen came from Queanbeyan for the Blessing. He spoke of the community's deep appreciation of all the volunteer firefighters' dedication to protecting people and property in often life-threatening situations.

Captain Tony Campbell of Colinton Brigade also addressed fire brigade members and supporters. He recognised the important traits of courage, sacrifice and persistence in our firefighters.

Firefighting is dangerous, stressful work. To emphasise the importance of peaceful rest after firefighting work, he drew attention to the Genesis-recorded seventh day of rest after God's creation of Earth.

From that example of the necessity to look after oneself and resting after callouts, including asking for help when it's needed, he encouraged members also to look after others. He spoke of how meditation, although he had been cynical about it at first, had helped him manage stress.

The large crowd accompanied the recorded singing of Morning Has Broken and Amazing Grace.

Reverend Paul Cohen, with a backpack full of blessed water, sprayed each truck (and the occasional child waiting to climb in).

The barbecue was cooked by the good folk from the Anglican Church. They timed the sausages and onions perfectly for the end of the ceremony.

It was an excellent get-together for members of different brigades. The convivial atmosphere augured well for their teamwork in the coming season.

Origins of the Blessing of the Fleet

From Wikipedia: 'The Blessing of the Fleet is a tradition that began centuries ago in Mediterranean fishing communities. The practice began predominantly Catholic, but is now practised by all Christians as a blessing from the local priest and pastors that is meant to ensure a safe and bountiful season.'

The practice is alleged to have originated in the 18th century. It seems to have much earlier roots, though, being connected with propitiation of the gods of the sea by fisherfolk and other marine travellers. It lives on in Michelago as a blessing of the region's fleet of fire trucks, not boats.




