

She then introduced the Hon. Kristy McBain, the Member for Eden-Monaro, Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories, who complimented the Michelago community on their persistence and achievement, thanked them for the opportunity to officially open the bridge and cut the Ceremonial Red Ribbon with the Ceremonial Scissors.

Then everyone (about 40 people) wandered to the Michelago Railway Station for an excellent afternoon tea, including bubbly for extra celebration.

Thanks to Michelago RFS Captain Abby Macpherson for lending the CAT1 fire truck, to Peter Butler for driving it (with the occasional Ceremonial Siren) and to Kerry Rooney for organising the occasion.

Thanks also to Kerry for making two large trays of sandwiches and the grazing platter, Janet Kelly for two slices and Di Fett for a cake. Everything was appreciatively eaten.





#### **Councillor Corner**

#### CMRC Councillors Tanya Higgins and John Rooney

The new term of Snowy Monaro Regional Council began with a bang on 10 October 2024, when the new Councillors met for the first time at a contentious swearing-in ceremony.

Despite continuous challenges to every aspect of the proceedings from some new members, the two Michelago candidates were eventually sworn in as Councillors: Cr Tanya Higgins (formerly Deputy Mayor 2021 to 2024) and Cr John Rooney (formerly Mayor 2017-19 and Councillor 2019-21). A secret ballot was held to elect Cr Chris Hanna as Mayor and Cr Tricia Hopkins as Deputy Mayor. Neither Tanya nor John contested either position.

Several new Councillors called for an Extraordinary Meeting of Council on 17 October 2024 to discuss (as a matter of urgency) Council's Unreasonable Complainant Policy, the resignation of Council's Chief Executive Officer (CEO) David Hogan and the process for recruiting an interim CEO while a permanent replacement was found.

This meeting, like the first, was long and contentious. The new Councillors challenged everything, disputed the roles of staff, struggled to comply with standard meeting procedure and insisted on reading out lengthy passages from the Local Government Act and other documents.

Next week [i.e. from Monday 25 October –Ed] we have Local Government Training courses running all day on Tuesday and Wednesday. We sincerely hope that the new members will attend to gain a better understanding of their roles and meeting procedures. Tanya and John are well versed already but are keen to get a refresher course as the Local Government environment is complex and highly regulated.

Michelago is fortunate to have two experienced Councillors who have agreed to work together to get the best outcomes for Michelago and Snowy Monaro. Although Tanya and John have different political affiliations, they agree that party politics are not really important in local government. We look forward to meeting more of our fellow Michelagoans and helping them get what they need from Council to ensure the Michelago region and its village prosper.

### Remembrance Day 11 November – 10.45, Michelago Railway Station

At the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month, we traditionally gather to observe a minute's silence to remember the official ending of the end of World War I in 1918, the war in which so many Australians gave their lives. Now it commemorates all who died in war.

There'll be a cake stall, a sausage sizzle and a coffee van, plants and some local produce. It's a chance to do some early Christmas shopping.


There are still some spots available for stallholders and local produce sellers. Perfect timing for a Spring Clean. Turn pre-loved goods into cash. Sell your excess produce.

#### Bocce – Sunday, 10 November, 2pm, then see if that suits

Michelago SOCIAL Bocce. Would people be interested in getting together to play bocce over summer at Michelago's Clive Kelly Oval, by the MRCA BBQ?

<u>Why bocce</u>? Well, it's easier to play than pronounce (but perhaps harder to master). It's fun. It's sociable. It is suitable for all ages and abilities. It doesn't need the construction of a special court. It leaves one hand free to hold a drink or a sausage-inna-bun.

<u>And</u> it complements a 'village lifestyle' – just ask people in little European towns about how they have socialised since forever.



#### What is bocce?

It's a ball sport belonging to the boulles family. Developed into its present form in Italy, it is closely related to English bowls and French pettanque, with a common ancestry from ancient games played in the Roman Empire. ('Apart from health, education, roads, and aqueducts etc, what HAVE the Romans ever done for us?')

<u>The balls are made from</u> wood, metal, or plastic and are 70-107mm diameter and weigh 600 - 900 grams. So they are a heavy grapefruit. A set contains 8 balls and the smaller jack (target).

<u>Where is it played?</u> Bocce is traditionally played on a natural soil, gravel, grass, or asphalt court about 25m long by 4 m wide, but any agreed available rectangle big enough to gently toss a ball about will do. You mark the 4 corners of the 'court' with cones or something. There are as many variations to the rules as there are ethnic regions to play the game. Just agree what version you are playing before tossing the jack.

How do you play? Rules can be flexible if agreed, but here's the go.

- The game is between two teams of 1 to 4 players per side. Each team throws 4 balls total OR each player tosses two balls each.
- The balls are tossed underarm. Have a quick look at social media for Trevor Chappell bowling circa 1981 to see a text book definition of underarm bowling (oh, the national shame!). A bit like lawn bowls except the ball is lobbed, not necessarily rolled.
- The winner of a coin toss starts.
- First the jack is set tossed about 2/3 the way down the court. Then the first team throws their first ball, aiming to get as close to the jack as they can. Then the other team throws.
- The team which does NOT have their ball closest to the jack throws until one side has thrown all their balls. Then any remaining balls are thrown.
   OR
  - Teams take it in turns to throw (like lawn bowls).
- The aim is to get as many of your balls closer to the jack than the nearest opponent ball.
- Parts of the game: a match consists of a set of frames, each consisting of all the balls being thrown and the progressive score tallied. The trailing team gets to set the jack (and go first) in the next frame.

Matches can be first to 7, first to 13, a set number of frames ... whatever floats your boat.

- What day of the week? First time, Sunday 10 November, 10am. Then discuss whether a week night after work during daylight saving, or a Sunday, or both, or not bothering at all.
- Ball storage: sets could be left at the tennis clubhouse (possibly in an old filing cabinet), at own risk, and used by different groups as desired. An old set you don't want would be perfect.

Any special clothing? Just closed-toe 'sensible' footwear. Hat, sunscreen.

#### Anything else?

- Agree not to inconvenience others, e.g. cricketers, tennis players, dog-walkers.
- No intra- or inter-state comps or Brisbane 2032 just Michelago social fun.
- Not a formal club, i.e. no fees, insurance, committee.
- Have a get-together in the tennis pavilion/clubhouse if the weather is wet or the General Store if weather is really wet.
- Bring an extra bocce set if you have one.
- Please pass the idea on. Hope to see you 10 Nov, 10am.

#### **Michelago Memorial Hall**

Registrations opened last week for the 2024 edition of the Garage Sale Trail, a nationwide event promoting reuse and recycling. Local residents are encouraged to host their own sales or join group sales in their neighbourhood across two big weekends from 9–10 and 16–17 November 2024.

Teaming up with your neighbours to create a street sale is a great way to boost your impact, and more importantly, boost your sales.

'The yearly Garage Sale Trail is a fantastic opportunity for our community to connect, earn some extra cash, and keep valuable items out of landfill,' said Aimee Moy, Education Engagement Officer at Snowy Monaro Regional Council. 'Whether you're looking to sell pre-loved treasures or hunt for bargains, there's something for everyone.'

Participants can expect to find a wide range of items, from designer fashion and midcentury furniture to cookware, vinyl records, children's items, and tools. On average, sellers make around \$457 from their sales, proving that what's pre-loved can be both planet and pocket-friendly.

Registration is free and easy. Sellers receive access to how-to guides and promotional resources to help make their sales a success. Shoppers can plan their trail using the Garage Sale Trail website, ensuring they don't miss out on any hidden gems.

'By participating in the Garage Sale Trail, our community is taking a simple yet effective action to build a circular economy here in the Snowy Monaro,' Moy added.

'It's a win-win situation – declutter your space, make some money, and contribute to a more sustainable future.'

This year, Snowy Monaro Regional Council is planning to host two secondhand group sales – one in Jindabyne and another in Cooma – as part of the trail. These Council-run events will complement the individual and group sales organised by residents.
