Entries included local riders and those from as far away as Tamworth. The event was sponsored by local business Hanson Rural Contracting.

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

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## Michelago Cricket Club cruises again

Sunday 2 February.

The focus. The determination. The camaraderie. The acceptance of error. The celebration of triumph. Give it a go and she'll be right. This is social cricket.

It was a hellishly hot day out on the Clive Kelly Oval but you wouldn't have known it from the unrelenting efforts of bowlers and batters. Cooling relief arrived at 4pm with The Calwell Doctor.

The Canberra opponents were The Tuskers, they of the assertive elephantshirts. The MCC's shirts showed a contrasting, understated elegance: white, shoulder flashes, the club's name. At right. Models Mushy and Mo. Mushy, a promising young player, trained with Sydney Thunder at the Big Bash early in the season.

Cut to the chase: Michelago won by 20 runs. In this A Grade comp., 3 of the 5 losses (and one forfeit; not enough players) were very close, but it seems the team won't have quite enough points to get into the finals.

For some of the atmosphere of this match, Magpie gives you some scattered notes.

Mo opened the batting with a quick 30 runs. 'Beautiful at square leg, mate!' Niv Turner did a quick-fire 62 and Manny got 46.

At 2.40pm, with Mick Wren batting (out for 47), the MCC was 4 for 208 with 8 overs to go. 'We're aiming for 250 or so,' said Ben.

A relaxed someone said, 'Oh, I'm in, am I? Better get a hat, then.' Everyone gets a go.

Phil hit three fours in a row, then a massive six that 'went to the base of the Tinderries', said Captain Matt, then was caught for 28.

Mick Wren clean-bowled the middle stump of the Tuskers' captain, who'd stuck it out for 17 overs, frustrating for us. Then Mick started bowling 'offies', i.e. off-spin, turning right. That did it.

What the appalling behaviour <u>has</u> achieved is the exhaustion of men and women of goodwill who want rational discussion and have been used to working together for the good of the shire.

The two Michelago Councillors cannot, understandably, comment publicly on this situation.



#### Bank of Bins – MRCA letter to SMRC Councillors

<u>Subject</u>: Reasons to vote NO to the motion to relocate the Michelago Bank of Bins: Council Meeting Monday 3 March [*Breaking: vote on BofB motion deferred to 20 March –Ed.*]

Dear Councillors, With copy to CEO

I am writing to ask you to vote NO to Councillor Thaler's motion to relocate the Michelago Bank of Bins (BoB). This motion will effectively stop work on repairing the BoB while a futile search takes place for an alternative location. There are no alternative locations unless SMRC has the budget to acquire land.

This motion is very unpopular in Michelago.

A Facebook post on the Michelago Noticeboard on 16 Feb about the relocation of the bank of bins received 64 comments. <u>None</u> of these comments supported the motion. Here are some examples of the responses:

- If the BoB is relocated due to noise and traffic complaints, will the RFS Shed and Community Hall be next? (These buildings are all co-located.)
- It's ridiculous to allow the actions of one individual's vandalism to change the location of the BoB to the cost of the community.
- There are no other locations despite Council having searched for one in the past.
- A resident who lives 100 metres from the BoB said they have no problem with it.
- Another nearby resident said they have no problem either and they walk past the BoB daily and have never experienced any foul smells.
- Yet another village resident said they visit the RFS shed (next door to the BoB) and Community Hall (directly across the street from the BoB) regularly and have never noticed the BoB smelling
- A compromise could be a curfew for use of the bins to reasonable hours.

This motion will cause an unwarranted delay to the repair of the BoB, costing Council more money in terms of additional wages for staff in the form of overtime rates for Saturday mornings and additional fuel costs for additional trips for two trucks from Cooma to Michelago. When Council originally consulted Michelago residents on the introduction of the BoB, residents were told emphatically that Council could not afford to continue paying overtime rates to send two to three staff to Michelago with the waste and recycling trucks every Saturday. Normally, when the BoB is operational, the Council recycling and waste trucks collect from the BoB on their same trip to Michelago to do the kerbside collections for the village residents.

This motion will cause an unwarranted delay to the repair of the BOB, costing residents money in terms of higher fuel costs to travel to Bredbo, in many cases a round trip of over 80 kms. This motion will delay the badly needed repairs to the bins causing residents who cannot get into Michelago regularly on Saturday to stockpile waste and recycling at home for weeks until they can make the journey to Bredbo Transfer Station.

For many Michelago regional residents, Bredbo Transfer Station is well over 40 kms away from their homes. Many Michelago regional residents work on Saturdays or have commitments to take their children to sporting activities.

I urge you to vote in the interests of the community of Michelago and at the same time, save Council from unnecessary additional expenditure.

#### Heritage restoration

The long-awaited repairs to the heritage-listed Michelago Railway Station began on Wednesday 19 February. They've been approved by Heritage NSW. Alaistair Saunders, skilled in heritage restoration, began the process of repairing plaster.


The necessary repairs and restorations were pinpointed by heritage consultant Pip Giovenelli in 2023 (see *Magpie 22* and *24*). Heritage NSW agreed to fund them with \$16,390.00 if UGL, which has oversight of NSW regional rail, agreed to match the funding. UGL has at last agreed to do so



after the tradesmen's work is done. Now the work can begin. On Sunday 16 February, MRCA volunteers Graeme, Miz, Sally, Kerry and two Leannes readied the station for the restoration work by cleaning out unnecessary items and packing up the useful and historically precious ones.

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19 and 20 February: Alistair prepped the walls, removing the old, damaged plaster in readiness for the repair work.

Liam will be their special guest. After the cemetery, the group will tour the heritage-listed Michelago Railway Station. The Trust has asked Kerry Rooney (née Kelly) to talk about the history of Michelago and the station. Invited members of the old settler families will contribute stories, too.

Leanne Thurling (née Coffey) will bring her coffee van and cater morning tea.

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#### **Tennis Clubhouse upgrade**



Wayne Hatcher, bricklayer and master of many construction skills, has stepped in to help the Hall Committee upgrade the clubhouse. Roscoe Cowling, long a central Michelago figure, had quoted for an MRCA Boco Rock funding grant but then decided to retire after many years working around Michelago.

The grant was to cover the silver foil on the back wall and the inside of the two half-walls at the front with corrugated metal to match that on the side walls.

Wayne had to stop the work when he discovered active termites in one of the back bench's timber supports. There's now a warning sign against people sitting on it and Wayne has placed barriers to the bench. The Hall Committee is now liaising with Council staff for termite treatment. This could take a while: the Council department responsible for arranging termite treatment for the Memorial Hall cannot do it for the tennis clubhouse. That has to be done through the staff in charge of sportsground facilities. Of course.



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#### Weeds – how much can Council do?



#### Council Media Release 28 February

Did you know that Council's weed control program on its network of roads, reserves and operational lands is almost entirely funded by your rates? Unfortunately, in the current climate it is very difficult for government agencies and landowners alike to attract funding to manage widespread weeds and so the cost of control is typically down to work by the landowner. On occasion, funding is made available through specific programs and Council embraces these opportunities to reduce the burden on its budget, enabling available funds to be redirected to other maintenance and construction projects.

Like all land managers, Council has an obligation to manage state and regional priority weeds on its lands. State and regional priority weeds are defined either within the NSW *Biosecurity Regulations 2017* or within the South East Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan and include weeds like orange hawkweed, parthenium weed, Coolatai grass, Spanish heath and gorse, to name a few. Widespread weeds such as serrated tussock, African lovegrass, St John's wort, blackberry and thistles are no longer designated as state or regional priority weeds.

Most weed control on Council land is not undertaken because of a legal obligation, but instead as a good neighbour policy. Like many landowners, Council manages a variety of weeds on its land to protect its assets and to limit spread to neighbouring lands. Roadsides are a well-known vector for the spread of weeds and Council manages weeds on roadsides to limit this spread for the benefit of the broader community.

As part of its recent cost-saving measures, Council further reduced its weed spraying budget in the 2024-5 financial year to \$540,000. With this budget reduction came some hard decisions and a reduction in service levels in some areas. Specifically, Council has rationalised its weed control program by reducing the number of contractors engaged to control weeds, by reducing expenditure in areas where weeds are prolific on adjoining lands and by further prioritising the weeds that it controls.

'Our budget for spraying (priority) weeds on Council lands is directed primarily towards protecting the region's agricultural and environmental assets from the impact of weeds', Council's Biosecurity Coordinator, Brett Jones, said. 'That means that the vast majority of weed control efforts occur in the areas to the south, east and west of Cooma, with only a skeleton budget retained for managing weeds to the north of Cooma.' Mr Jones said 'We have applied other cost-saving measures like boom-spraying road verges. This practice, where appropriate, serves to both reduce vegetation height along the road verge for safety reasons and it controls a lot of the weeds that would otherwise have to be spot sprayed at greater cost. In addition to that, it reduces our reliance on slashing, which has a significantly greater impact on our budget and is a primary vector for the spread of weeds.'

The cost savings were introduced as a result of Council's financial challenges and its focus on becoming more financially sustainable into the future. With over 2,500kms of roads to manage and a short growing season for most weeds, Mr Jones warns that 'in many cases Council's weed spraying activities simply will not occur in a timeframe or to a standard that we have achieved in the past. We will, however, continue to prioritise the control of African lovegrass and other widespread weeds in the higher quality agricultural areas where they are not well established.'

Following this, a brief inspection of the Burra shed facilities was made, and briefings were given by several senior members of the Burra brigade in the shade of their new barbecue shelter.

Several fire trucks from both brigades then travelled in convoy to undertake a general reconnaissance of the area and to inspect possible staging areas for possible use in fire events.

The trucks were deployed to hypothetical grass and housefire scenarios based in the rapidly expanding new residential area at Mount Burra, where the residents of two properties graciously allowed us access to simulate fighting of fires hypothetically advancing towards and threatening their homes.

At the conclusion of the exercise, all the participants adjourned in mixed groups of members from both brigades in several of the trucks, sharing knowledge, tactical methodologies and experiences whilst rolling back to the Michelago shed for sandwiches, cakes, drinks, further discussion and expressions of appreciation for the organisers.

The event, although rather casual and social in nature, was acclaimed as highly successful and enjoyable and a valuable opportunity for members of different brigades to get to know one another better.

It was agreed that the easy-going and informative nature of the event made it both interesting and enjoyable, and that further events of this kind would be highly beneficial to all involved.


There are four good reasons for joining the Michelago Region Community Association:

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## Australia Day – further comment

There were some interested comments about the Magpie 33 article published from The Spectator of 25.1.2024. The Magpie takes no stand on the various arguments but, for balance, publishes the following complementary view written by journalist Chloe Sargeant and published 25 January 2022 on www.sbs.com.au/voices

'The conversation surrounding changing the date of Australia Day from January 26 has become steadily more mainstream in the last few years. Australia Day or differently-titled holidays celebrating the Aussie identity have been celebrated on a range of dates throughout our history.

In the past few years, <u>large-scale Invasion Day rallies</u> have made mainstream headlines, youth radio station triple <u>j</u> announced they would be moving the Hottest 100 from January 26 in order to depoliticise the music countdown and make it available to all Australians, and usage of the #ChangeTheDate hashtag on social media has become widely recognised.

While the conversation remains ongoing with strong voices on both sides of the issue, it might be worth delving into the historical adaptability of the date. Many Aussies are steadfast that the national day has been celebrated on January 26 since the moment British boots landed on Aussie soil, up to this very moment - but this isn't actually the case.

So, here's a round-up of just some of the dates we've celebrated 'Australia Day', or similar holidays that celebrated Australia's founding or Australian identity.

<u>Australia Day - 30th July.</u> The first ever official national day that was actually named 'Australia Day'! On July 30 in 1915, the first official Australia Day was held, which was actually to raise funds for the World War I effort.

Ellen Wharton-Kirke, from Manly NSW, made the suggestion to Premier Sir Charles Wade, reportedly due to the enlistment of her three sons. According to the <u>Australian War Memorial</u> <u>website</u>, "Mrs Wharton-Kirke had seen the generosity of the Australian people during other fundraising days and saw an 'Australia Day' as a way of drawing on the pride of Australians in their soldiers' recent achievements at Gallipoli. 30 July 1915 was the date agreed upon, and events were held across all of Australia."

<u>Australia Day - 28th July</u>. In 1916, the Australia Day committee that had formed (to organise the war effort fundraising the year before) determined that it would be held on July 28.

<u>Anniversary Day - 26th January (NSW)</u>. Previous to 1888, New South Wales was the only place that celebrated Australia Day (then called Anniversary Day) on January 26.

These celebrations were all Sydney-centric (other states and territories had their own celebrations to mark their founding). For example, Governor Lachlan Macquarie held a 30-gun salute at Dawes Point to mark 30 years as a colony in 1818.

In 1837, the first Sydney Regatta was held. In 1838, crowds of people attended the event and to see the hoisting of the New South Wales flag. South Australia, Western Australia, and Van

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Diemens Land (Tasmania) were toasted as sister colonies, despite having their own celebratory day.

In early colonial times, the 26th was also called 'First Landing Day' or 'Foundation Day' by some and would be celebrated by European immigrants (particularly ex-convicts) by holding anniversary dinners. Some would begin their festivities the night of the 25th, with <u>records</u> existing of ex-convicts participating in "drinking and merriment" to celebrate their new home from as early as 1808.

<u>Hobart Regatta Day - 1st December (TAS)</u> This annual event, which is still going (and is the longest-standing public holiday in Australia) was once Tassie's annual celebration of being Australian. Tasmania has celebrated Hobart Regatta Day since 1838, as it commemorates the anniversary of Abel Tasman's discovery of Tassie, in 1642. Since 1879, Regatta Day has now been held in January or February.

<u>Foundation Day - 1st June (WA)</u>. Now called Western Australia Day, the date of this holiday actually moved around every year. It was held on the first Monday in June, to commemorate the founding of the Swan River Colony in 1829.

Lieutenant-Governor James Stirling, who was aboard the merchant vessel *Parmelia* and sighted the coast on June 1 (officially proclaiming the Swan River Colony June 11), thought an annual celebration was necessary to unify the members of the colony.

It was called Foundation Day up until 2011. After a series of law changes, which recognised WA's Indigenous peoples as the original inhabitants of the land, the day was renamed to Western Australia Day in 2012.

<u>Proclamation Day - December 28 (SA)</u> Proclamation Day was a celebration of the date the government was established in South Australia as a British province in 1836. This was South Australia's 'founding day' celebrations until 1910, when they officially unified with other states to celebrate Australia Day on January 26. However, formal celebrations for Proclamation Day are still held at Glenelg North on December 28.

<u>Australia Day - 26th of January</u>. All of the states and territories of Australia were celebrating the national day together by 1935, 83 years ago, although it was still known as Anniversary Day in NSW and Foundation Day in other areas.

First Nation Peoples have been protesting the date for almost the same amount of time, with the first official 'Day of Mourning' being held by the Australian Natives Association in 1938.

In 1938, the Sesquicentenary - or 150th anniversary - of British colonisation of Australia was widely celebrated in all state capitals. The main celebrations were held in Sydney, but newspapers from other states show that language had now evolved around January 26 to be a national date of significance.

Brisbane's *Courier-Mail* told its readership that the date was not of interest just to NSW anymore: "Sydney has the pageantry, but the event it recalls and reconstructs is significant to all Australians. A nation was founded when Governor Phillip landed at Port Jackson. To that nation

we all belong" was written under the headline, "A dream that came true".

In 1946, the Commonwealth and state governments agreed to unify all the state-based Australia Day celebrations and celebrate on January 26 as a country; the public holiday was taken on the Monday closest to the 26th.

Australia Day officially became a public holiday for *all* states and territories only 24 years ago, in 1994.'
